MacMahon Sets Pace in 3-Mile
The special invitation three-mile jog arranged for Montague, the crack English distance man, was the thriller of Friday's events. The race was run in a down-pour and the track was soft and slow. The time under the conditions was good. Eleven men faced the starter and Graf of Nebraska went off into the lead. MacMahon stuck with him and Montague, picked as the winner, was right behind. Graf led at the mile but at a mile and a half MacMahon took the lead and Montague went into second place. Nightingale was well in the rear. On the last lap of the two-mile mark, the New Hampshire man put on a burst of speed and went into the lead. His time was 10 minutes flat.

Medley Relay Team Runs Well
MacMahon was ten yards behind after the sprint for Montague had also picked up. Nightingale had a lot in reserve and was never headed by the Englishman. The Granite State college runner steadily increased his advantage. The Britisher was in distress at the end of the sortie and it seemed that MacMahon might overtake him but his lead was too great and the Cardinal and Gray runner finished ten yards behind the Englishman.

The relay team did better than was expected in turning in a fourth place in the medley relay. Ted Bossert started the event and was well up in the pack as he handed the baton to Jim Downey after the first 220 yards. Downey held the place and Chittick, running in the quarter, handed the stick to Bardes in fourth place. Bardes did not improve or lose but ran steadily and romped in for fourth honors.

Half-Milers Outclassed
The two-mile quartet composed of Ollie Bardes, Bill Gurney, Carol Stone and Yard Chittick was hopelessly outclassed in the American college championship tilt. The race was copped by the combined Oxford-Cambridge team in the new world's record of 7 min., 50 2-5 seconds. The Britishers ran remarkably well. The second man, Stallard, who was last man at the close of the first lap, made up forty yards and was first by three yards. Technology was well in the rear all the time and had no chance for a position.

Downey started in the 100-yd. dash but was eliminated in the trial heats. Bossert did not run, as Kanaly wished to save him for the Harvard meet Saturday.
