1923 CONVENTION COMMITTEE STARTS FINANCIAL CAMPAIGN

Voluntary Contributions to be Placed in Boxes Near Main Lobby

Yesterday marked the start of the financial campaign of the freshman national convention. Boxes have been placed just off the main lobby for contributions to carry on the work, and as there is no direct assessment made on members of the freshman class, members of the committee state that contributions from upperclassmen as well as freshmen will be welcome.

The minutes of previous Republican conventions have been obtained and are being studied by those in charge of the political gathering here so that everything may be as much like the real thing as possible. The Republican Club of Boston is aiding the movement and last Tuesday sent former treasurer Burrill and delegate to national convention to give the section representatives inside information on the subject.

Speakers Being Picked

HARVARD RUNNERS SCORE WIN OVER TECHNOLOGY ATHLETES

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The first turn was a bit ahead of Yard Chittick. In the home stretch, Spitz turned on the reserve supply of speed and came down the straightaway like the wind. Chittick crept up a bit in the last 30 yards but Spitz was well ahead and finished a good stride ahead of him. Jim Downey trailed Chittick by five yards, but beat the first Harvard man home, making the event a clean sweep for Technology.

O'Connell and Gourdin Star

Frank Kanaly pulled a big surprise when he sent Billy MacMahon out for the mile. Carol Stone led O'Connell, Harvard's star at the distance to the half-way mark with MacMahon at the Harvard captain's heels. O'Connell shot away on the third lap and Stoney was out of it till the last half lap. He came up strong at the finish and cut the Harvard man's lead down to 25 yards. MacMahon was a bad third.

Another surprise was seen in the 220. Jack Poole trimmed Gourdin and Ted Bossert easily. Gourdin was picked to win by the dopesters with Bossert, the likely choice for second. Poole was a good yard or two in front of Gourdin and Ted Bossert so close to the latter that the spectators thought he was second. The judges ceded the place to the Crimson runner and Bossert was given third. Poole was the second dark horse of the afternoon. His time under the conditions was good.

MacMahon Fails in 2-Mile

When the two-milers were called out, it was nothing but Billy MacMahon in the stands but after the first lap it was readily seen that MacMahon had tired from the mile and was hopelessly out of it. He fell back steadily, sprinting now and then. Sanborn was up at the front all the time till the last lap, when Lewis and Bond spurred and finished ahead of him. This event upset the dope more than any other on the card.

Ollie Bardes lead the half-milers all the way till the final thirty yards when Goodwin, who had trailed him a few steps behind, nosed ahead in a beautiful sprint. Yard Chittick, after placing second in the quarter sailed in third in the half.

Ash Takes High Jump

Clark, star on Harvard's football team, won the shot put and George Dandrow placed next to him. Dandrow, however copped the hammer throw and made it eight points scored by him for the Red and Gray. Luke Walton was beaten in the pole vault by Harwood who placed second in the I. C. A. A. A. meet last spring. Pete Ash cleared the high jump bar at 5 ft. 9 in., which was good enough to win. Dipple earned a second in the broad jump.
