In the 135-lbs. weight, Fritz Paul '22 cleaned up in the tournament and fought at Yale, while Bobby Rhoades, '22, who did not come out for the team till late in the season, gave Tom O'Malley, the Penn wonder, the scrap of his life at Pennsylvania.

Egil Christensen '22 was the varsity man in the 145-lbs. class. At Pennsylvania he met a formidable opponent in Bresslin, losing by a narrow margin in an extra round. Fred Koch '21, a beginner this year, was the representative in this weight until an injury put him out for the season. He gained his place on the team against the hardest of competition, and lost a very close bout against Ellingston of Yale.

Intercollegiate Association Planned
Tommy Proctor '21, was one of the star men on the team. After the Yale meet he trained down from the 175 lbs. class, and fought at Pennsylvania at 158 lbs, taking off six pounds in twenty-four hours to accomplish it. In spite of this feat, he won easily from Bessil by his superior stamina. Jim Hayes '21 gave Captain Bourne of Pennsylvania the surprise of his life in the 175 lbs class, the Penn captain almost taking the count in the first round. Hayes is only a beginner and much is expected from him next year.

Throughout the year the team was much assisted by Willie Corbett '21, the Somerville professional who is attending the Institute. With every one on the team back at school next year and the development of new material from boxing classes this summer, it is expected that Technology will be ably represented in the meets of the Inter-collegiate Boxing Association next season.

This association will be organized under the auspices of the National Collegiate Association of America, by means of a committee appointed by the president, Col. Pearce, Technology is represented on the committee by Dr. Rowe, chairman of the advisory council on athletics, who will confer with the graduate managers of the principal colleges of the country at the intercollegiate in Philadelphia, May 28. It is fully expected to make boxing a sport national in scope, and already the possibility of holding inter-collegiate championships in Mechanics Hall in Boston next year is being discussed.

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
