best in the country. He is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and a member of the Council of the Society of Naval Architecture and Marine Engineers.

#### Author of Many Books

With the starting of the ground school of Military Aeronautics at the Institute two years ago, Professor Peabody acted as president of the board, later becoming president of a similar board of the Naval Aviation Detachment. Besides being the author of many books on steam engineering and naval architecture, Professor Peabody is nationally known as an authority on thermodynamics. He is retiring as a Member Emeritus of the Faculty.

Professor J. R. Jack will be the future head of the department, having been prominent in naval construction work in Scotland before coming to the Institute two years ago.
