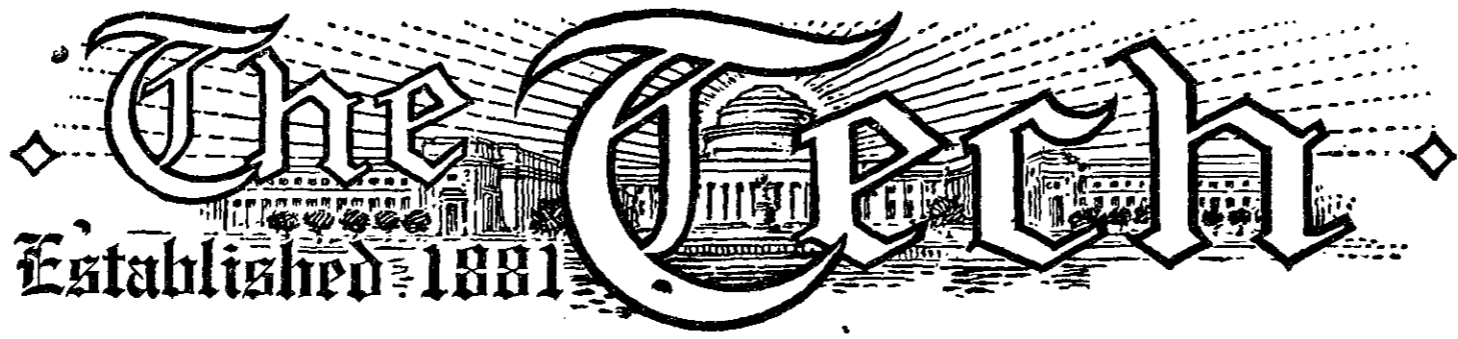

# FIRST CONVOCATION IN WALKER MEMORIAL TUESDAY

## CROSS-COUNTRY MEN SET FOR N.E.I.C.A.A. CHAMPIONSHIP RUN

Bates, Williams, and New Hampshire State  
Strong Contenders for First Honors Over  
Franklin Park Course

### DOUBTFUL IF SANBORN WILL COMPETE

Captain W. K. MacMahon '22, wearing the number 90 on his back, heads the list of Technology's entrants in the annual New England Intercollegiate cross-country run which will be held tomorrow morning over the Franklin Park course starting promptly at 10:30 o'clock. Although the team has been showing up well in practice and has improved greatly since defeating Harvard and Dartmouth, it will be greatly handicapped by Sanborn's leg refusing to show any material improvement. Coach Kanaly said that he would be unable to decide until immediately before the run whether or not he would allow Sanborn to enter. Clarence McIntire will be the seventh man in case Sanborn is held out. The remainder of the team is the same as competed against Dartmouth namely: Arthur Flanders, Bob Hendrie, Carol Stone, Jack Hennessy and Don Robbins.

#### Team Has Stiff Competition

The work of Flanders has been especially noticeable recently since he has been consistently staying right up with Captain Billy. Stone and Robins declare that they are in better form than ever before.

Upon being asked for a statement of the team's chances Frank Kanaly, coach of the team, said, that while the men with the exception of Sanborn were in excellent condition there were several exceptionally strong teams entered such as Williams, Bates and New Hampshire State and if the men were fortunate enough to bring home a victory it would be only after a close hard fight.

#### Other Colleges Optimistic

The strongest competitors for first honors, in addition to Billy MacMahon, are Richard and Raymond Buker of Bates, who finished first and second in the Maine intercollegiate last week, Crofts of Williams, who has been breaking records set by his former team mate H. H. Brown, New England two-mile champion, and Cy Leath, New Hampshire State star.

## DR. HENRY SUZZALLO COMES TO INSTITUTE TO ADDRESS MEETING

Acting President Elihu Thomson  
Accepts Invitation of Administrative  
Committee to  
Preside

#### SUZZALLO NOTED ORATOR

The first convocation of the present school year, the first convocation to be called by the present administrative committee, and the first convocation ever to be held in Walker Memorial will take place in the main hall of Walker, next Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 16 at 4 o'clock.

Dr. Henry Suzzallo, president of the University of Washington, Seattle, noted educator, writer and public orator, with a national figure, will address the gathering which is expected to consist of students, Faculty and members of the Institute Corporation.

Dr. Elihu Thomson, acting president of Technology, has accepted an invitation from the administrative committee to preside at the convocation.

**Suspend Convocation During War**  
Dr. Suzzallo's subject is "The Working Code of the College Man," which leaves much to the imagination, regarding the contents of his address. One thing is certain. Dr. Suzzallo is an orator of the first water and if he is given the sort of reception that convocation speakers in the days before the war were wont to receive, he will warm to his audience and deliver a remarkable speech.

The administrative committee learned that Dr. Suzzallo was in the East on business and realizing his ability as a speaker, persuaded him to address this convocation which they hope will be only the first of a series to come throughout the school year. Before the war it was the
