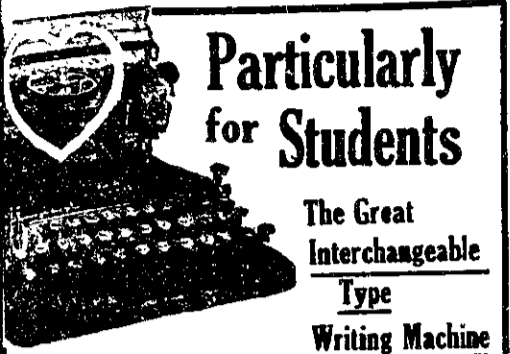

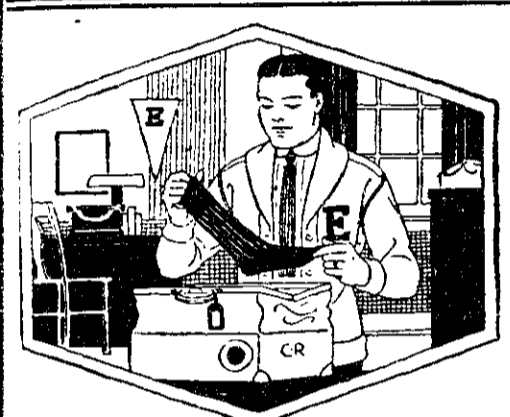

BIG GEORGIA DELEGATION HERE TO STUDY "TECHNOLOGY PLAN"

Liam H. Walker, Director of the Division of Industrial Co-operation and Research, familiarly known as the "Technology Plan"; Governor Hugh P. Dorsey, of Georgia, and Doctor K. G. Matheson, President of the Georgia School of Technology. The afternoon will be devoted to a tour around Boston, ending at 5:30, at which time the visitors will meet again at the City Club and be received by a committee of the Chamber of Commerce, of which Mr. Everett Morss, President of the Simplex Wire & Cable Company, is Chairman and Mr. H. H. Hunt, of Stone & Webster, is a member. The other members of this committee have not been announced.

New York Next On List

Following the Chamber of Commerce dinner the party will leave South Station at about 10:30 p. m., on their special train, for New York City.

The tour, as stated by President K. G. Matheson, of Georgia Tech, is "to give Georgians a visual demonstration of how Georgia's natural resources may be turned into wealth by following the northern and eastern sections of the country in combining science with industry." This is the idea which the Institute has worked out in its "Technology Plan" by which over two hundred of the industries of the country have retained the Institute in an advisory capacity. The party is being brought primarily to the Institute in order to see the advantages and help which a scientific or technical school offers to the industries, if properly equipped and fostered by them, and it is the ambition and hope of the Georgia School of Technology to attain a similar position with respect to the Georgia and other southern industries.

Cincinnati First Long Stop

The schedule for the party, which left Atlanta late Wednesday afternoon, shows Cincinnati as the first all-day stop, with an inspection of the Rockwood Pottery Company and the Proctor & Gamble "Ivory Soap" plant, leaving for Pittsburgh at 9:30 p. m.

All Friday was spent in Pittsburgh, beginning with a welcome from civic bodies and the Georgia Tech Club; there was an inspection of the laboratory and equipment of the Mellon Institute of the University of Pittsburgh; luncheon at the Westinghouse Electric Company, as guests of President E. M. Herr and an inspection of the Westinghouse plant.

On Saturday, the 20th, the party is at Buffalo, where they will visit the Lackawanna Steel Plant, the Pierce Arrow auto plants in the morning, and after luncheon the Curtis Airplane Company and Dunlop Rubber Company.

Sunday will be devoted to sight seeing at Niagara Falls, with the ex-

RECOGNITION SOUGHT

Want Official Sanction for Basketball Team

Basketball enthusiasts are endeavoring to obtain official recognition from the Advisory Council on Athletics. L. T. Blood '22, A. R. Tonon '22, and R. K. Thulman '22, the leaders of this movement have had 85 men signify their intention of coming out for a varsity basketball team. Doctor Alan Rowe, secretary of the Advisory Council promised a special meeting to consider basketball, if it is deemed advisable, as the council does not meet again until December 7.

Yale has written relative to a game and negotiations are pending with Dartmouth and some of the small New England colleges. A tentative date has been made for early in February with Harvard. John Dowd, recommended by the Harvard A. A. is being considered as a possible coach. Several members of last year's fast and scrappy Sophomore team will be among the candidates for the five Varsity positions.

WRESTLING TEAM HAS GOOD PROSPECTS FOR THIS SEASON

Coach Burns Will Group Men into Several Classes

If the number of men who turned out for wrestling Tuesday night is any indication of the type of team that will represent Technology in this sport, then the Institute can be assured of an excellent season. About 40 men, most of them upper classmen, appeared. Among those who made their mark at Andover, are Freeman, Roberson, Tuttle, Ames, and Briggs. The latter wrestled last year, although he did not make the varsity. Of the varsity, Strauss, Butler, and McGrady turned out. Rosenfield appeared, but he will not be able to turn out for the team until after Christmas on account of his injured knee.

Coach Instructs Novices

Coach Burns gave general instruction to the mat-men, and demonstrated the half nelson and side holds to what novices appeared. Instruction will be given twice a week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 4 o'clock to 6 o'clock, and if enough men turn out, Coach Burns will try to be present from 2 o'clock until 6 o'clock. Due to the large number of men that appeared, the wrestling enthusiasts will be divided into several classes, each to practice at definite hours of the day. Those who are inexperienced and desire to obtain efficient instruction will be organized into a novice class. Of the wrestling candidates, 15 men will be picked by the coach for the varsity squad, and of these, seven will be chosen to represent Technology on the mat. The others will serve as substitutes. The wrestling squad will practice on the scheduled days between 4 o'clock and 5.

CUT IN MANAGERS COMPETITION

Both freshmen and varsity swimming teams are practicing three times a week at the Boston Y. M. C. A. tank. More men are needed for the varsity squad, this being in evidence at Wednesday's practice when only a score of men reported. Herb Holmes, the coach will attend practice next Monday for the first time. The first cut in the managerial competition has been made by Manager R. C. Geckler '22, who states that the following three men are retained: Meeche, E. H. Miller and M. Morgan, all in the Class of 1922.

Of the freshman team Henninger is doing good work in plunging and Berger in the fancy diving. It is not too late for men to enter the competition for freshman assistant manager.

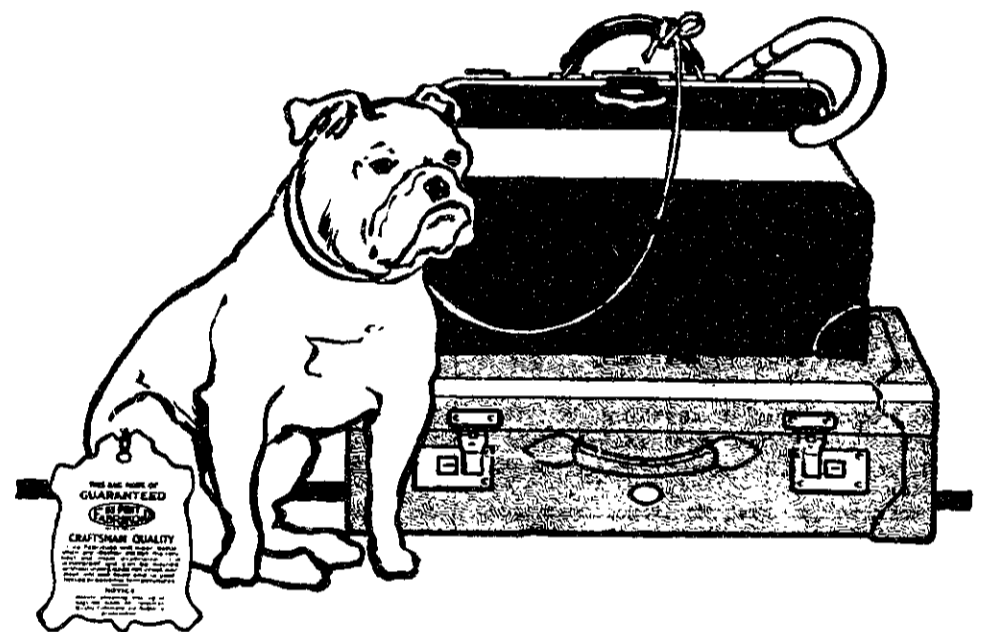
