"There isn't a working man in the world who doesn't respect discipline, and I don't think there is a man in the entire universe with a drop of red blood in his veins, who doesn't bitterly resent abuse. I have known several of the finest plant owners, who have told me that they felt about their labor as about their own sons, but for some reason or other the men seem to hate them. It didn't take me very long to find out where the trouble lay. The trouble started with the under foreman, who was arrogant, abusive, and intolerant of the men under him, which had destroyed all the confidence in the plant, and this had naturally reflected back on the management."
