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## TECHNIQUE 1922 DISPLAYS TRADITIONAL CONSERVATISM

**No Radical Change In New Volume**

Technique 1922, which came into the world with a bang yesterday morning, has now taken its place as the thirty-sixth volume of Technology's year book. The board of the new volume has introduced no radical changes in the book, but has rather attempted to uphold the tradition of a complete and conservative record of the Institute year. A few departures from late practice have been made, but in general arrangement and presentation of material the conventional style has been adhered to closely.

**Dedicated to Eastman**

The new volume appears in deep red, finely grained leather, relieving the monotony of the sombre black that has clothed Technique for the past few years. The cover design is severely plain, bearing the name of the book and the Institute seal in gold. The finest quality heavy glossy paper has been used throughout the volume, including the advertising section. Instead of the customary border around the pages, there appears a narrow "running head" at the top of each page, those on the left bearing the name of the book, and those on the right carrying the name of the section.

The 1922 board has dedicated its work to George Eastman, "in acknowledgment of the debt of gratitude owed him for his unlimited interest and generosity" to the Institute. Following the engraving of Mr. Eastman the first section of the book consists of a series of seven pen and ink sketches of the Institute buildings by J. A. Bowers, which fill the place of the customary photographic views.

The Faculty section is introduced by a symbolic picture, portraying a tossing ship under the command of her officers. The material is arranged in the customary order, by courses. The photographs of the Faculties of the different courses, are uniform in size, but show variety in background. It has been the object of the editor to have the pictures taken in appropriate surroundings where practicable. The section is concluded with two pages of "informal" photographs of faculty members.

**Senior Portfolios in Groups of 8**

Due to the large number of men in the graduating class, the photographs in the senior portfolio have been grouped in panels of eight. With this grouping there are seventy odd pages devoted to photographs and statistics of the 1921 men. The panels are pages and the statistics of each man appear opposite his photograph. There are three pages of names and

statistics at the end which appear without photographs, on account of the failure of these men to get their pictures in time for publication. A memorial page dedicated to the three men of the class of 1921 who died during their Institute careers, brings this section to a close.

A full page color design introduces the classes. In this part of the book are grouped the officers of each class, informal pictures of the member of the class, and the famous "Who's Who in the Class of 1922." The unusually large number of informals, makes this section more than usually attractive. Results of the "Who's Who" ballot are sure to prove interesting to all concerned.

**Pictures Profuse in Athletic Section**

The Athletic section, which follows in order shows great care in the compiling and arrangement of material. Complete records and a large number of photographs go a long way in making up for the fact that the early publication of "Technique" made it impossible to put in many of the current season's results. Individual stars of the track team appear in outline, and a two page outlay of snapshots of the New England Intercollegiate Track meet of last year forms a new and interesting feature of this section.

"Institute Activities" occupy a larger part of the volume than any other section. This heading includes Institute Organizations, Publications, Honorary Societies, Clubs, Professional Societies, the Dormitories, Senior Week, Junior Week, Tech Show, Musical Clubs, Summer Camp, the Reunion and Special Events of the year. A great mass of material has been brought together by the Societies Editor and arranged neatly and accessibly, so that it is available for reference. With a few additions of newcomers the fraternities section remains quite the same as it has been in past editions.

In the matter of "Grinds" the new book has followed in the footsteps of its predecessors. "The Book of Techfros" is the most ambitious piece of work in the section.

The usual General Information, acknowledgments and student directory carry the reader through to the advertising section.

In presenting this volume the 1922 board has attempted to give to the student body the most attractive and serviceable book that the price would allow. A little extra income which was not foreseen at the beginning of the year was put back into the book. This has made it possible to insert more colored plates, more informal photographs, and a more substantial binding than was originally planned for.
