840 Copies Technique Given Out After Rush

This will continue until April 9. Those who have lost their sign-ups will be provided for by giving their names at the booth. Any who wish copies but failed to secure sign-ups may give their names for the waiting list, which the Board expects to be able to fill, according to their statement.

More books were given out at this year's Rush than on any previous year,—about 840 copies. Since that time the books have been going fast, but no definite figures have been given as to the exact number.

Book number 6, in the Rush, was secured by W. L. Hawes '22; P. G. Blampied '24, took number 7.

A special leather-covered copy of Technique was sent to George Eastman, to whom the volume was dedicated. During Junior Week, before the Friday performance of Tech Show, the Technique Board gave a dinner at 60 Anderson street. All members of the Board were present and the visiting ladies were guests. Special leather menus, stamped in gold with the cover-seal of Technique '22, served as favors of the occasion.

### Addresses at Institute Given on April 12-13-14

George Sherwood Eddy, touring the Eastern colleges in the spring of this year, will deliver his 1921 message to the students of Technology in a series of addresses at 4 o'clock on the three successive days—April 12, 13, and 14, in the main hall of Walker.

Letters have been sent by the general committee, managing the Sherwood Eddy campaign at the Institute, to all the fraternities, clubs, and societies, asking them not to stage any other events on these three days if possible. There is also fraternity and a dormitory committee co-operating with the general committee, of which W. B. Purinton '22 is chairman.

In a period of 16 days last January, Eddy delivered 35 addresses to the colleges of the Western coast; he spoke at the University of Washington to 3,000 students at the opening assembly, and to 2,500 at Oregon Agricultural. Recently he returned from a trip through 18 of the principal countries of Europe and the Near East, and is now in great demand by the colleges of the United States, many of which he is granting only one-day engagements, because of the pressure of time. He is regarded as an authority on student problems from the religious standpoint by the American colleges.

After his three addresses in the main hall of Walker, he will leave for Dartmouth, where he will address the student body.
