**SEAT NEW MEN SOON**

**New Officers Must be Elected To Institute Committee**

The importance of holding the elections for the officers of the various professional societies was stressed by K. R. Sutherland '21, secretary of the Institute Committee on the ground that these men as well as the new class officers who will be picked in the elections on Tuesday, April 5, will be expected to attend the next meeting of the Institute Committee, which, incidentally, will be the last official meeting of the present governing body, and which also will be a joint assemblage of the retiring and newly elected members of the committee. A written recommendation must be obtained before a man is given a seat upon the committee.

In order to satisfy the Federal amusement tax requirements and furnish the Walker Committee with complete information, W. G. Loesch '21, moved at the Institute Committee meeting held yesterday afternoon, that a complete financial statement be filed with the Walker Committee by the organization giving an entertainment in Walker Memorial not later than one week after the affair has taken place. The motion was carried.

**Approve Reports**

Reports on the condition of the finances, read by L. W. Conant '21, and W. W. Bainbridge, Jr. '22, treasurer and assistant treasurer, respectively, of the Institute Committee, were approved. The elections to the Technique Board, and Musical Clubs were ratified.

The Tech Engineering News was refused a seat upon the committee due to the interpretation of the by-laws which call for the existence of an organization for three terms before it is entitled to representation, as meaning three 15 week terms instead of the same number of terms of the present length.

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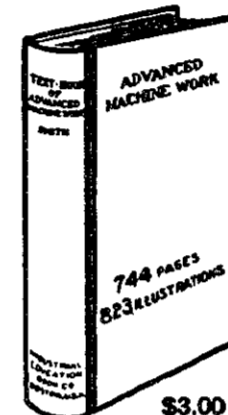
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
