

COMMITTEE ELECTS EDITORS OF 1923 TECHNIQUE BOARD

Electoral Board Names C. A. Brantingham and G. R. Johnson as Societies and Portfolio Editors Respectively

EXPECT TO FINISH SOON

At the meeting of the Electoral Committee held yesterday afternoon, the position of Societies Editor and Portfolio Editor were filled by the election of C. A. Brantingham and G. R. Johnson, respectively. The recommendations of the 1922 Technique Board of J. E. Berla, Art Editor, W. J. Hennessey and R. E. Winslow, Assistant Art Editors was accepted as read.

Brantingham, a member of Phi Beta Epsilon was elected by a unanimous vote, on the fifth ballot after the withdrawal of J. M. Keck, due to his election to the position of Publicity Manager of the Musical Clubs. Johnson, a member of Delta Upsilon was elected on the fifth ballot by the necessary three-quarters majority, which was in this case 15 votes.

C. A. Brantingham was elected Society Editor of Technique 1923. He prepared at Hill School, where he was on the football and rifle teams. He entered the Institute with the class of 1923 and during his first year was on the Institute Committee, the track team, and was captain of the freshman football team. During his second year he was on the Electoral Committee and Junior Board of Technique 1922. On Field Day he played on the Sophomore football team. He was in charge of the trip to Kendall Green in connection with the Sherwood Eddy campaign and is now connected with the meetings department of the T. C. A.

Johnson was out for manager of track in his first year and also in the chorus of Tech Show. In his Sophomore year he made the Technique Junior Board and is also a member of the Electoral Committee. He is a member of Course IV Engineering option. He prepped at Worcester Academy where he was president of the senior class, treasurer of the A. A. and an associate editor on his school paper, the Vignoria.

J. E. Berla, who was elected Art Editor, is a member of Zeta Beta Tau, while Hennessey and Winslow are not fraternity members.

32 APPLICANTS SELECTED

The successful candidates for Course XA have been selected by Professor R. T. Haslam, in charge of the course. There are thirty-two names in the list of the successful applicants.

These men are to be divided into three groups which will rotate in order in the three stations, one at Bangor, Me., another at Everett, Mass., and the third at Buffalo, N. Y., spending eight weeks at each plant. The course will start July 5. LUMBERJACK ORATOR TO SPEAK AT HUGE SMOKER

Sherman Rogers Will Explain Labor Unrest at Professional Societies Smoker Tomorrow Evening in Walker

TICKETS TO BE HAD AT MAIN LOBBY

"Quit Passing the Buck" is the subject which Sherman Rogers will speak on at the Combined Professional Societies Smoker tomorrow evening at 7 o'clock in Walker Memorial, and judging from the way the tickets are going this smoker will be one of the largest held at the Institute this year. As the membership of the Combined Professional Societies is about 2400 students, this smoker will have an attendance of more than 2000 members.

Mr. Rogers is known as the lumberjack orator and has for some time devoted his efforts to bettering the working conditions of the lumbermen engaged in the logging industry throughout the United States. Mr. Rogers has, through his experience in many logging camps, gained a wide knowledge of laboring men in gener-

EDDY AN ENGINEER

Has Had Wide Experience in Travels Abroad

George Sherwood Eddy, who is coming to the Institute to address the student body in Walker on April 12, 13 and 14, was graduated at Yale Sheffield School in the Class of 1891. Then for a period of 15 years after his graduation as an engineer, he worked among the students of India. For nine years he acted as the student secretary of Asia for the Y. M. C. A.

During 1912-1913, Mr. Eddy with Mr. John R. Mott, carried on extensive work by means of a series of lectures among the students of China. Immense throngs came to hear him and the attendance was so large that successive meetings had to be given at consecutive hours to accommodate the crowd.

When war first broke out, Mr. Eddy was with the British Army in France, and later was with the Americans on the French and British fronts. Since the armistice he has been working among the stricken countries of Europe, and is returning to the United States after 18 months service touring the principal countries.
