HOLD CONVENTION

Will Form International Liberal Society

The University Liberal Club of Harvard has received acceptances from 12 different colleges to the announcements which were sent out inviting all students interested in the discussion of contemporary political, social and international affairs, to attend a conference on April 2 and 3 which will be held for the purpose of organizing an Intercollegiate Liberal Society.

The program for the convention includes addresses by Walter Lippman, of the "New Republic" and author of a number of books, Edwin F. Ladd, Senator from North Dakota, Francis Nielson of "The Freeman" and H. M. McCracken, president of Vassar College, as well as discussions concerned with problems arising in the formation of the proposed society.

The society will be national in its scope and will have as its principles "the cultivation of the open mind; the development of an informed student opinion on social, industrial, political and international questions; the encouragement of inquiry; the presentation of facts; subservience to no isms; and the education of the college youth in the problems of citizenship."

Up to date, the 30 cubs that appeared have been given batting and fielding practice, while battery eliminations have been narrowed to R. S. Seddon, W. H. Kennett, G. C. Canfield, and F. W. Lyons. Seddon, however, has strained a ligament in his leg, while trying out as back-stop, but it is expected that he will recover before the season starts.

On the infield line-up, P. K. Bates already shows promise of handling tricky bunts, while among the outfield contestants, Ferguson, Robertson, Michelena and Leon have already proved their ability at the bat. With special efforts being made to turn out efficient batteries, there is but little doubt, that the first game of the season, slated for April 16, will find the frosh team in excellent condition.

that they get themselves into trouble by following the dictates of some irresponsible radical because of ignorance and that the solution of the problem is a better understanding between the employer and employee. His subject will deal with this phase of the labor question tomorrow night, and the ways of combating the present unrest among the laboring classes.

There will be three reels of moving pictures shown at the smoker. One deals with the construction of the modern airplane, another, the lumber industry showing the process through which the lumber must go before it is ready for commercial use. The last is a comedy entitled "One Week" and is a picture portraying the troubles of a man who bought a house in knock-down form and attempted to put it together himself. MUSICAL CLUBS HOLD BANQUET

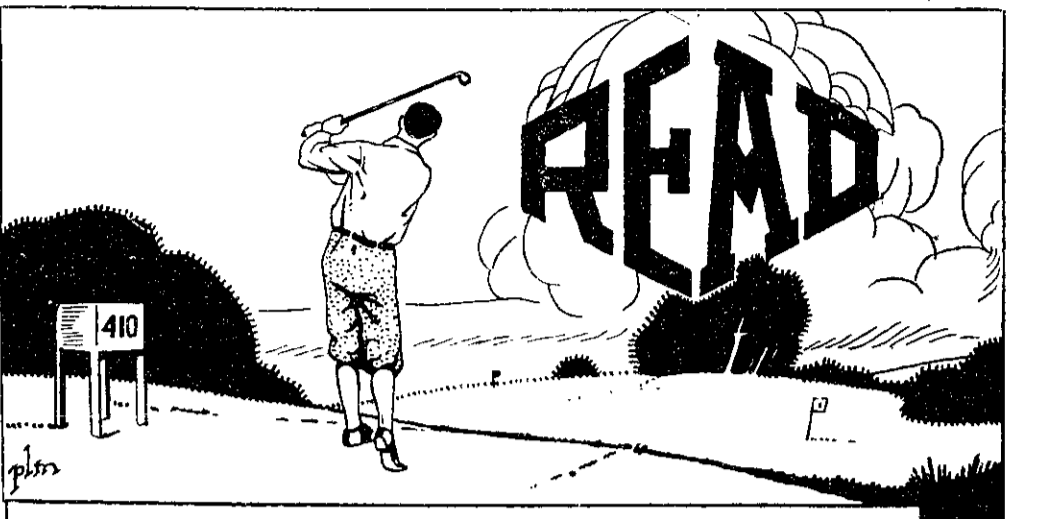
