The freshman baseball team held scrimmage games Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons, with the result that the first cut was effected. Seven candidates for pitcher were retained, no cutting being done from the battery. A practice game will be held tomorrow with Harvard Dental School. This will be the first time the team will be able to measure its strength. The first game scheduled is a week from tomorrow, with Dean Academy, at Franklin.

Players In Good Form

It will be hard to determine who to put on the mound, although Lane has been showing good control. Weyland, a former pitcher at West Point, will soon take charge of the pitchers. Seddon has shown up best behind the bat, but Taylor and Possiel are competing for the same position. Ayles has been out of the game for the past few days with a twisted neck, so Delchanty has been unchallenged as shortstop. Sharkey does some fast infield work from second, but is closely pressed by Parsons. Bates has been doing remarkably well on third base. Holsberg and Chapin are even competitors for first.

Robertson stands out prominently in both fielding and batting, and will probably romp in the left meadow. Both his catching of flies and his pegs home are surprisingly accurate. The whole aggregation is hard hitting, and there is little fear of opposing pitchers.

Despite the delay caused by the inclement weather last week, the team is showing good form. The final squad will probably be smaller than the above by a catcher, one or two fielders, and possibly a couple of pitchers. The captain will be elected after the Dean Academy game.

MANY MEN WILL BE BACK

Hughie Nickle, the veteran goal keeper of this year's hockey team, has just been chosen to head the Beaver's aggregation next winter. Nickle, who comes to Technology from Kingston, Ontario, tended the net in practically all the games of the past season and showed an exceptional ability at stopping the puck. Without doubt he stands on a par with Holmes of Harvard, as one of the best net tenders in college circles today. His uncanny ability saved Technology from many defeats and he will probably be better than ever next season.

Strong Team Next Year

Next year's team, however, will not be a one man combination, Captain Dan McNeil and Delany being the only members of the team who will be graduated this June. Captain-elect Nickle will hold his old position before the net but Denton Massey has proved himself a reliable substitute, especially in the Dartmouth game. Neil McNeil will be back at his position at point, but he will lose his running mate, Delany. The loss of Dan McNeil who has played center for the past two seasons will be severe. He has always been the mainstay of the Beaver's attack and it was not by mere luck that he shot more than half of the goals that Technology chalked up. Caudwell, Taylor and Grant will probably report to cover the wing positions. The class of 1924 holds a lot of likely looking material also, particularly Ayles and Ross and there will be a host of men available who were kept out last season by the one year transfer rule.
