Henderson, the new Athletic Editor, is a member of the Delta Tau Delta fraternity and prepped at Austin High. He played on last year's frosh basketball team, and is taking an Architectural Course at the Institute.

H. C. L. Miller is Associate Editor of the new board, and is a member of Chi Phi and Beaver. He was cox on one of the Institute crews until lately, and is one of the Assistant Managers of Crew now. Miller was an officer of the class of '23 this year, serving on the Executive Committee, and a member of the electoral committee. Philadelphia is his home town, where he prepared at Germantown Academy.

C. E. Lord was elected Photographic Editor. He is a Course IV man, and entered the Institute last year as a Junior freshman from the University of Maine.

Hampton Statistics Editor

A. C. Hampton will take care of the figures as Statistics Editor of the board. Hampton was on the Junior Board of Technique this year, on the electoral committee, and is an Assistant Night Editor of THE TECH. He prepped at Bloomfield High.

A. R. Holden was ratified as Faculty Editor, and is a member of the Theta Chi fraternity. He was secretary of his class this year and during his freshman year and also acted as Secretary of the electoral committee. He was in the chorus of Tech Show and on the Varsity relay until he was suddenly stricken with appendicitis during Junior Week.

WILL AWARD LETTERS AT ATHLETIC DINNER

Make Plans To Hold Banquet For All Men Who Have Institute Insignia—Will Give Out Letters

TO COME OFF NEXT MONTH

The M. I. T. A. A. is now making plans to hold a strictly athletic banquet to which all men who have won athletic insignia and probably all who have won their numerals this year will be invited. The time and place of the dinner have not been decided upon, but it will probably be held in Walker or at the Engineers Club sometime after the meeting of the Athletic Advisory Council early next month. The insignia for winter sports that have not been granted yet will be voted at the next Advisory Council meeting and these awards will be made at the Banquet.

Establishes New Custom

Up to this year, the "shingles" have been sent out by mail, but the M. I. T. A. A. hopes to establish the custom of giving out all the letters formally at a meeting specially for the purpose. The object of the gathering is to attach a little more importance and sentiment of the award of the insignia by making this award at a meeting of all the athletes in the Institute. Until this year, all the separate teams have held their own Banquets at various times. The A. A., however, has decided that it would be better in all ways to hold one big gathering of all the athletic teams annually at the close of the winter season and make this dinner one of the big functions of the year. Next month, when the first annual banquet of the combined athletic teams is held, there will undoubtedly be at least 200 letter men in the group. Awards of letters for Indoor Track, Swimming, Wrestling, Gym, Hockey, Boxing, and Fencing will be made at the time. Also, the Swimming Team will probably announce the election of a captain for next year. The freshman and Sophomore Field Day teams have always held a combined dinner and it will be along much the same idea that all the Athletic Teams will combine for one get-together annually.

Bainbridge is assistant treasurer of the Institute Committee, is on the Finance Committee of the Institute Committee, and is a member of Alpha Tau Omega.

The recommendations of the managers of the basketball, swimming and fencing teams were tabled by the committee until the books of the teams are closed. The books of the teams are open because of outstanding indebtedness.

An important decision was made relative to the banquet of all men interested in Institute athletics. It was definitely decided that such a banquet be held in the middle of May in Walker Memorial. Further arrangements were turned over to the committee appointed for this purpose. All men connected with athletics during the past year are to be invited.
