SIGNUPS MAY BE MADE SOON

Corporation XV elected officers for the coming year at their annual banquet in the faculty dining room of Walker Memorial on Tuesday evening. Seven men were elected as officers and members of the board of directors. R. H. Brown '22 was elected president, E. A. Ash '22, secretary, and W. W. Bainbridge '22 treasurer. A. E. Meling and R. C. Rundlett '22, were elected to the senior board of directors, and D. Massey '23 and W. B. Murdoch '23 to the junior board of directors.

tion in Box Office

Great interest has been shown in the events of Senior Week by the return of a large number of ballots mailed to the members of the Class of 1921 for ascertaining the sentiment of the class. Signups for a blanket ticket to include the Class Dinner, Picnic, and Senior Prom will be put on sale Wednesday, May 11, from 12 to 2 o'clock, in the Box Office. The cost of the signup will be \$3 and of the ticket \$8.50. The cost of single tickets for these three affairs totals \$10. Owing to the limited number of couples who can be accommodated at the Senior Prom, only 200 of the blanket tickets will be issued. Single tickets for the picnic, dinner, and Pops will be placed on sale at a later date.

An overwhelming majority, as shown by the ballots, favored wearing white flannels at the Prom, which, however, need not detract from the elaborateness of the affair.

The picnic which comes Monday, June 5, will comprise an all-day trip to Pemberton and will be limited to men only. The ticket includes the boat-ride to Pemberton and return, a good dinner at Pemberton, and swimming pool privileges.

Dean Burton made a short opening address and introduced Professor Emerson of the architectural department who represents Technology on the American University Committee. TRACK MEN OFF FOR PENN GAMES AT PHILADELPHIA

Six Men Will Represent Technology at Annual
Intercollegiate Meet Today and Tomor-
row—130 Colleges Entered

DANDROW ENTERED IN TWO EVENTS

Six of Technology's best athletes left last night for Philadelphia where they will represent the Beavers in the Annual Intercollegiate meet which will be held today and tomorrow. The men who are making the trip are Captain Billy MacMahon, who will run in the International Two Mile, George Dandrow, who is booked to throw the 56-pound weight and put the shot, Mich Bawden, Oliver Bardes, Charlie Snow, and Jack Hennessey, who will compose the two-mile relay team. Coach Frank Kanaly decided not to send a sprint relay team because the lane they were assigned to, number 17, made a creditable showing by the team, practically impossible. There will be no man entered in the individual sprints since the application for admission was in too late to be accepted.

The program for Friday starts with a concert by the band at 2 o'clock. Following this, come the grammar, high, and parochial school meets. The first intercollegiate event on the program is the college sprint medley championship of America. At 4:45 o'clock, Billy MacMahon is scheduled to run in the special two mile event. The entrance of several foreigners in this race gives the event a truly international character. The definite entries have not been announced but it is certain that the field will be exceptionally fast. Following this comes the Pentathlon and the intercollegiate distance medley run. Next is the 56-pound weight throw. George Dandrow, wearing the Cardinal and Gray, is entered in this contest and the chances of his placing are very good. Dandrow won this event last year at the same meet with a throw of 29 feet 3/4 inches. The last event of the first day is the running hop, skip, and jump.
