Coach Kanaly has definitely announced that Bardes, Bawden, Snow, and Hennessey will be the four men who will compose the two mile relay team that will represent the Beavers at the Penn Athletic Carnival this Saturday. Bardes captured the 440 in the Interclass Meet last Saturday and placed third in the half-mile. Bawden took the half mile event and got a third place in the quarter, while Snow drew a second in the 880. Hennessey has been running in good form lately but did not place in the meet Saturday.

In addition to the two mile relay team the Beavers will be represented by Captain Billy MacMahon in the International Two Mile where he will run against Nightingale, the New Hampshire star distance man. Dandrow will represent Technology in the hammer throw and from competitive figures for the season, should have a good chance of coming through with a win. Coach Kanaly expects to send a man to represent the Institute in some other event but he has not decided as yet just who it will be. Bossert, Hayes, Howlett, and Dexter are all being considered.
