was too fast. The race was run in extremely fast time, being in fact only 4-5 second behind the record of 7 min. 53 sec. Yale in winning barely edged out Iowa State and U. of Penn. The running of the last leg for Yale by Tom Campbell was one of the features of the afternoon.

The much talked of French team proved a disappointment. The wearers of the tricolor received a great ovation when they appeared on the field each day but were only able to take fourth in the sprint medley Friday, and sixth in the one mile relay championship Saturday.

Captain Walter Higgins of Columbia produced one of the outstanding performances of the Friday afternoon's performance when he, in running the mile leg in the distance relay, covered the mile in the fast time of 4:19 2-5 seconds. Higgins will be remembered as the record holder of the Intercollegiate cross-country course at Van Cortlandt Park, New York. Although he was unable to win for his time, the handicap of the other teams being too great when he took the stick, he managed by running one of the finest races ever seen to regain 30 yards of the 100 which his team mates had lost.

Although the weather both days was most unpleasant with rain, cold and wind, record crowds filled every seat of the 22,000 berth amphitheatre. Early Saturday afternoon seats were not to be obtained for any price.

The events began with the traditional promptness each day and there was never an idle moment in the numerous ringed carnival. In addition to the new major records which were established numerous minor marks were broken.

## FRESHMAN BASEBALL TEAM LOSES TO ANDOVER 6-5

The Freshman baseball team was beaten in a hard fought diamond duel with Andover Wednesday afternoon by a score of 6-5.

Not until the third out in the ninth inning was the game decided. The general sentiment among the players is that possibly the slight disadvantage of playing on a foreign field was enough to swing the scales.

Tomorrow afternoon the team will journey to Lowell, to play the Lowell Textile nine. Captain Bates maintains that if the good playing which was shown at Andover is kept up, a chance for victory, and at least a highly creditable showing, will result from the game.

One of the greatest surprises of the game was when Michelena, substitute fielder, caught Kennet in the last three innings. His showing was so excellent that he will probably start against Lowell Textile. Seddon started the Andover game behind the bat, and showed very steady work until replaced in the seventh.

In the seventh inning victory seemed within Technology's grasp. Three men were on bases and one out, Ayles walloped what looked like a three bagger. Only a remarkable fly catch by the center fielder saved the day for Andover. The side retired without scoring.

Deming lost an almost sure second when tripped and fell shortly before the finish in the 440 yd. run. Holt was leading the field in the third lap of the mile run when he lost his shoe. 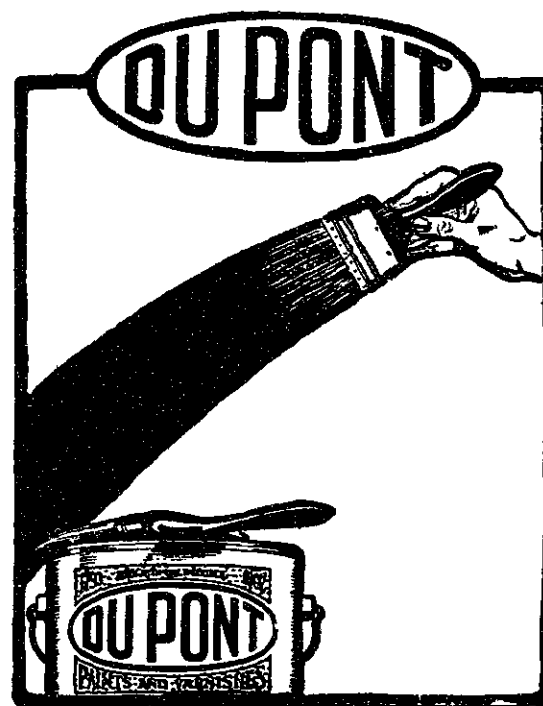
