## A.A. AWARDS INSIGNIA AT MEETING TUESDAY

### Elects Managers of Fencing, Soccer and Wrestling, and Captains of Fencing, Hockey And Swimming

OFFICIALLY RECOGNIZE FENCING

At the meeting of the M.I.T.A.A. last Tuesday, the association passed many recommendations for insignia. The final reports of the hockey and swimming teams were accepted. And other routine business conducted.

The captain of the fencing team next year will be E. E. Taylor '23, and the manager will be C. H. Blake '23. A. P. Kellogg and E. P. Thomas were retained as Sophomore assistants for next year. Recommendations passed for FTR were Attilio Canzanelli '21, James Nesmith '22, Francisco Ravacca '22, E. E. Taylor '22, and Erling Skabo '23. The association, after some discussion, decided that the fencing team should have full recognition as an Institute team.

J. E. Hoffman '23 was elected manager of association football for next year. The election of H. D. Nickle '23 as captain of next year's hockey was ratified. Numerals were awarded 12 freshman for hockey.

Nine men were recommended to receive RTR's. These were A. B. Alford '22, G. E. Dean '22, J. J. Gray '23, Sydney Hall '22, M. C. Hawes '21, P. M. Johnson '21, H. S. Rubens '23, and V. E. Whitman '22. Besides the above insignia, Johnson was recommended to receive a star for T with

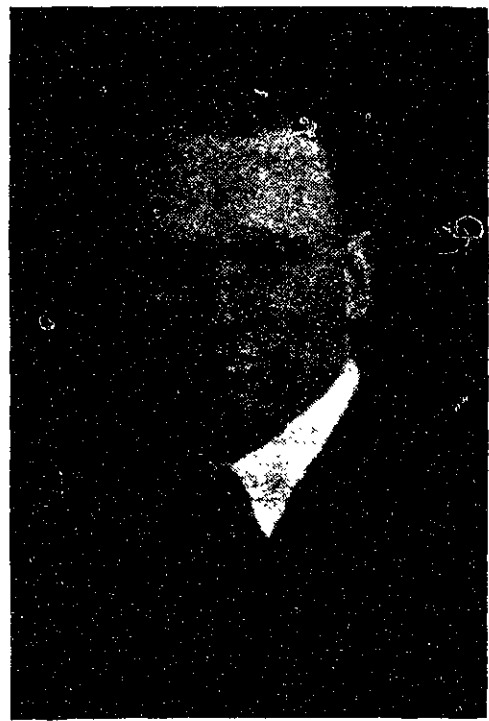
## TENNIS WIN KEEPS STREAK UNBROKEN

A frigid wind and the Institute tennis team conspired to furnish Worcester Polytech's team an uninteresting session last Wednesday at Longwood. The Technology court men were sufficiently unimpressed by the adverse weather to capture all six matches of the conflict and dropped out two sets in the process. Herm Broockmann again featured barely losing out P. P. Sah with two deuce sets.

Broockmann Pushed to the Limit  
P. P. Sah, one of the two Orientals visiting from Worcester, had Herm Broockmann throughout his match. Broock took the first fight after much suspense in a deuce set, 8-6. Sah got the hop on his serve in action and won the second, 6-3. The Institute lad was kept very nervous during the rubber and if the man across the net had not gone wild during the last five games Herm would have had some job securing his 7-5 win.

Bill Scott played R. E. Chapman, of Worcester, on an indoor court, outgeneralling his rival in straight sets, 6-3, 6-4. Carver played a great game trimming Li Chen, 6-1, 6-1. In a captain's duel, George Bijur against Bill Caldwell, the Technology leader took the match after a little fight, 6-2, 6-8, 6-2. In the doubles the Engineers had no difficulty making the tournament a clean sweep. Caldwell and Scott easily came out on top, 6-3, 6-3. Not enough effort was wasted to keep one interested. Broockmann and Carver also double-teamed their way to the big end, 6-3, 3-6, and 7-5.

The new general manager of the show, L. K. Cowie '22, hails from Salt Lake City, Utah. In his freshman year he was on the track team, and in both freshman and sophomore years he was a member of the class field day relay team. This past season he has been the stage manager

W. D. Scofield '23, the new business manager, served in the navy during the war as an officer. He was a member of the class tug-o-war team for two years, during which he also served as assistant business manager of Tech Show. He is a member of Masque, Course II, mechanical engineering, claims him among its number, and he is a member of the Mechanical Engineering Society.

Also a member of Course II, R. E. Sherbrook '23, the treasurer for next year, has served on Tech Show for two seasons. His freshman year he was in the chorus, and at the time of the last performances he was serving in the business department. Sherbrook is a member of Masque and Beaver.

W. L. Searles '23, who now assumes control of the publicity, has been serving in that department for two years. He is a member of Chiops and Masque. Last fall he played with the '23 football team. He is a Course IV man, and during the war was gassed in service overseas.

The stage next year will be under the direction of H. I. Beadle '23, a student in Course X, who has been serving in the stage department for two years. He resigned shortly after his election to the Technique 1923 Electoral Committee on account of being overpointed. He is a member of Masque and Beaver. During the war he served as a lieutenant in the marine corps.

## VARSITY VS. NORTON IN SEASON'S OPENER

### Three Crews Entered Tomorrow at Worcester Include First and Second Varsity Eights and First Freshman

FROSH FOUR RACES TODAY

The first Varsity crew race of the season will be staged tomorrow afternoon against the Norton Boat Club at Worcester.

The opening attraction will be in the form of a freshman race against Noble and Greenough School, to be rowed this afternoon at 5 o'clock on the Charles. The first four will be entered in this contest over a three-quarter mile course.

Three octets together with the necessary following of substitutes and managers will make the trip to Worcester on the 1 o'clock train for the clash with Norton Boat Club, on Lake Quinsigamond.

Races Start at 3:15 O'clock

The regatta will be of a three fold nature, starting off at 3:15 o'clock with a race in which the first freshman eight will carry the Institute colors.

After a 15-minute interval following the frosh oar dipping contest the junior varsity will sweep into action. The varsity set-to will come as the "piece de resistance" at 3:45 o'clock.

The watermen and all rowing enthusiasts desiring to accompany the oarsmen will leave South Station on the 1:10 train, so that the crews will have ample opportunity to row over
