**Institute Committee Choses Field Day Leaders**

At a meeting of the Institute Committee held yesterday afternoon, the managers of the 1925 field day teams for next fall were elected. There were also important changes in the by-laws regarding elections and nominations.

W. A. Metcalf '23, who was the captain of the 1923 football team for the last field day was elected to manage the team for the incoming freshman. Taylor hails from Rochester, N. Y., and prepared at the Rochester University where he showed his football ability.

Roscoe Smith, '23 was elected to manage the crew. Smith has had wide experience with crew and it is believed that he is well fitted for the position.

H. O. Tappen, '23 will lead the relay team while R. Shaw, '23 who captained his class tug of war team in his freshman and Sophomore years will instruct the new freshmen in the gentle art.

S. B. Robeson, '23, chairman of the Election Committee submitted some modifications in the existing by-laws regarding the nominations and elections. The report which was rather lengthy stressed the following:

One of the representatives of the Senior Class on the Institute Committee shall be Chairman of the Elections Committee.

**Make Strict Election Rules**

In all elections the Australian ballot shall be used while for contests such as the Technique Elector and Senior Class Day Committees the Hare system shall be used. As regards nominations, there shall be ten signatures on the blank except for the Junior Prom, Technique Elector, and Senior Class Day Committees where only five signatures are required. All blanks must be signed in acceptance by the nominee. These nominations must be published in THE TECH at least one day before election.

In order to do away with the complaints that were alleged to be founded on the conduct of the last elections, strict rules have been made for the running of the election and counting of the ballots. Locked boxes will be used and no unauthorized persons will be allowed in the voting rooms during the procedure of the balloting or counting of the ballots.

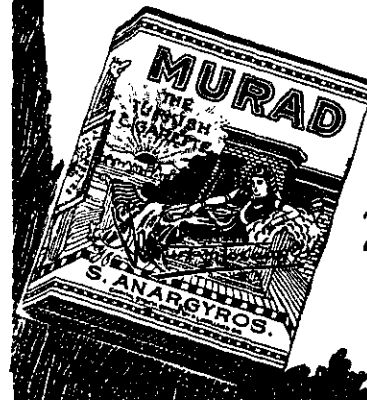
