

DARTMOUTH TRACK MEET TOMORROW

STRONG DARTMOUTH TRACK TEAM OPPOSES INSTITUTE

tion. The Institute runners have shown a weakness in both the hurdle events but, with the training that they have been putting in this week, they should make a better showing than they did in the Harvard meet last Saturday when Yard Chittick

was the only man to place in either race. Coach Kanaly has also entered Al King, Andy Anable, Scott, Mills and Bob Hershey.

Dashes Will be Close

The Institute sprinters will find an exceptionally fast man in Sherburne, Dartmouth's dusky star. He has been running some pretty races in the past two years. Al Hayes, the Beaver's best man in the century, has not been working on the cinders this week and will probably not be in his best form when he comes out tomorrow. Coach Kanaly, however, counts on Ted Bossert, Frank Howlett, or Jim Downey to break into the scoring in the 100. Coach Hillman, the Green mentor, has also entered Allen and Gruenhagen in this event.

Technology will show lots of strength in the 220 and this event will probably be a close race. Frank Howlett and Johnny Poole both placed in the Harvard meet and have been showing up well during the past week. Downey, Spitz, Bossert and Webster are all fast men who will be called upon to compete for the Cardinal and Gray in this sprint. Coach Frank Kanaly feels certain that his charges will take care of some points here and they may come off with a first. The Green places her hopes on the same three men that will run in the century: Shelburne, Allen, and Gruenhagen. Shelburne and Gruenhagen have both had considerable experience on the cinders, the latter having run for the University of Minnesota before he transferred to Dartmouth.

Strong in Quatrer

The Beavers will present an especially fast combination in the 440. Oliver Bardes, Mich Bawden, and Ted Spitz are three of the best quarter milers that have worn the Cardinal and Gray for years. In the Interclass track meet that was held on Tech Field April 23, they all came in within a few yards of each other, the winner doing the distance in the time of 51 seconds on a rain soaked track. In the same distance in the Harvard meet at the Stadium, Spitz ran off with first place in the time of

50 and 3-5 seconds. Oliver Bardes collected a second place in the same race. Smith, Alden and Clark will also be entered for Technology.

Dartmouth does not boast any stars in the 440 and the event should have a strong Technology flavor. All the entries for the Green are more or less dark horses and have not had much experience on the track with the possible exception of Dewey Gruenhagen. Hockenson, Suttmier, and George Behringer will all start the race for the visiting team.

880 Goes to Beavers

The two middle distances are Technology's strongest field events. Mich Bawden, captain of last year's team, ran a pretty race in the meet last Saturday and copped first honors in the half mile run. He has been running well all season and will make a strong bid for a first in his race tomorrow.

Although the relay team that he ran with at the Penn Games did not do all that was expected of them, it was due to no fault of his. Ollie Bardes, Charlie Snow, Jack Hennessey, and Bill Gurney are all entered in this same run. Bardes was on the team last year and has been doing well ever since. The other three men are on the team for the first time this year but should show up as potential point winners before the season is over.

The Green enters a host of inexperienced material in this run also. Shem, Cody, Granger, and Harkins have never had much experience on college tracks. Art Coakley and Bolles are both entered in this event but they are not at their best in this shorter distance.

Dartmouth will probably paint both of the hurdle events green but Coach Frank Kanaly is relying upon his quarter and half milers to overcome any lead that the crack Canadian timber topper will gain for the visitors. The sprints are about even and it is a toss up which side will collect more points here.

Mile Will be Close

From all the dope, the mile trot will be one of the hardest fought races of the afternoon. Technology and Dartmouth both enter a host of fast men and the fight for the initial place will be well worth seeing. Carol Stone will be the Beavers' headliner here. He has made a remarkable record in the mile in the three years that he has worn the Cardinal and Gray.

El Sanborn has shown that he is good for some points in the mile also. He collected a third in the last meet against a fast field. His performances with the cross-country bunch last fall showed that he is a good distance man.

The other men whom Coach Kanaly will start are Robert Bolster, Tom Gill, Sam Vadner and Harry Bruner. While none of these men are exceptional, they may break into the scoring column in the course of the afternoon.

The Green is not without stars in this race either. Coach Hillman expects to enter Coakley, Whittinghill, Bolles, Harkins, Johnson, and Sherburne to represent the Dartmouth team. Art Coakley is an exceptional runner and Hillman is counting on him to do a lot. He has run on the cross-country team there for two years and this is his second year on the cinders for the Green. He is known to the followers of Institute athletics as the man who beat Buly MacMahon out for first place in the Dartmouth-Technology cross-country go last fall. He is expected to give Carol Stone a hard fight for first place.

Bolles and Sherburne are two other Dartmouth entries who were in the cross-country game last year. From all indications, the mile that will be run tomorrow will be one of the fastest that has been run on Tech Field yet.

Two Mile Should Be Close

In the two mile, Captain Billy MacMahon is due to face his old rival, Art Coakley, and he will try to even things up for his defeat last year at the hands of the Green harrier. The two men can both cover the distance in about the same time and an exciting race is looked for. Captain MacMahon placed fifth in the International Two Mile run at the Penn Relays last month and easily took a first in the last meet with Harvard.

Bob Hendrie sneaked in for a third place in the last meet and he is likely to do the same trick tomorrow. McIntire may salt down a few points in this race and Johnstone, Freese, and Stone will also run for Technology.

Outside of Coakley, Dartmouth will enter a long list of entries in hopes that some of them will be able to place. Those that will start for the Green are Whittinghill, Sherburne, Merriam, Young, Bolles, Harkins, Perkins, and Miner.

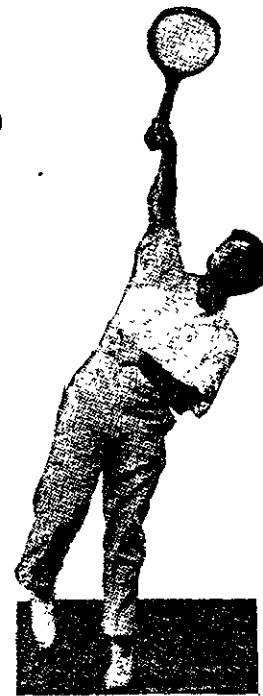
