JUNIOR VARSITY CREW LOSES TO ELI OARSMEN

Freshmen Win from Exeter but Second Freshmen Take Defeat from Crimson Crews—Four Makes Poor Showing

RESEAT VARSITY

The Junior Varsity crew suffered defeat at the hands of Yale's 150 pound crew, in a race over 1 1/2 mile course on the Housatonic, Saturday. Technology trailed at the finish by just one length. The freshman eight evened things up to some extent by defeating Exeter on the same day.

The Eli 150 pound crew, which by the way, is Yale's best bet over the mile and a half course, having repeatedly defeated its first varsity over this distance, took the lead from the start and held it all the way through.

At the end of the first quarter mile, one of the Yale oarsmen caught a crab. However, the crew recovered quickly, losing only two strokes through this mishap. In a sprint at the finish, Technology cut down Yale's length and a half lead, until no open water showed between the shells.

The blue oars flashed at a terrific rate with the light Yale crew rowing a 40 stroke, while Technology forged along with 30 strokes to the minute.

Exeter Falls Before Frosh

The freshmen, in their race against Exeter, which has already beaten the Harvard 150 pound frosh crew, sprang to the fore in the beginning, lost its lead on the first curve in the course, and then gained on the next bend, in which they had the inside of the turn, and finished with over a boat length to spare.

The other freshman crews made a rather poor showing during the week, the second trailing Harvard's 150 pound and third freshman crews on Friday, and the four, taking the wash of both Brookline and Huntington schools in a triangular regatta on Saturday.

The first Varsity as it will be boated today for the race against Union Boat Club over a 1 1/2 mile course will show the effect of a radical change. Morse, Valentine and Nowell, and Davidson, coxswain, have been shifted back to the first boat, and Sayre and Evans likewise being advanced. This afternoon, the men will row as follows: Evans at bow, Morse, 2; Driscoll, 3; Sayre, 4; Nowell, 5; Valentine, 6; McCurdy, 7; Molinar, stroke; and Davidson, coxswain.

Green Takes Hurdles

Thomson, the Dartmouth captain, showed up as expected and easily ran off with both the timber-topping events. He had little difficulty in running away from Sollitt and Weed, both of the Green, in the high hurdles. These three visitors made a clean sweep in the race. Yard Chittick, however, gave the big Canadian star some unexpected competition in low hurdles and finished a good second, within a few yards of the visitor. As a whole, the hurdles had a decidedly Green color.

Beavers Clean Up Mile

Both the long distance races, the one and the two mile events, proved easy wins for the Institute track men. Dartmouth could do no better than to place two thirds in these distances. El Sanborn had things all his way in the mile. He jumped to the lead when the starter fired his gun and no one was fast enough to challenge his lead all the way. Carol Stone of Technology and Merriam of Dartmouth passed and repassed each other sev-
