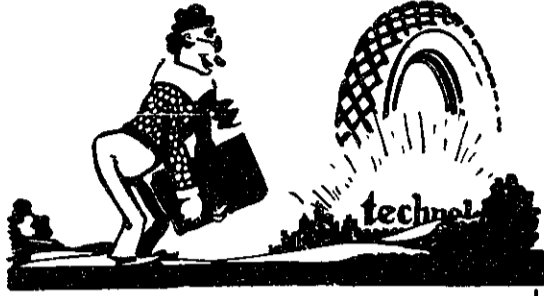


ORCHESTRA WILL CONSIDER ALLIANCE WITH TECH SHOW

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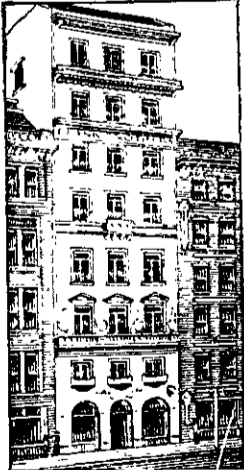
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because of a lack of strength felt by the latter, a combine between the two is being considered.

The combine is to last until the musicians are well on their feet, and have their reputation established.

eral times but the Institute miler shook his opponent for the last time on the last lap and finished in second place without any trouble.

The Beavers found no competition at all in the two mile event. Captain Billy MacMahon opened up with his usual large lead and held it without a hint of competition for the eight laps to the finish line. Bob Hendrie ran an even race and finished a good second without apparently tiring himself in the least. Coakley, Dartmouth's star in the long distances was unable to run.

Field Events Go to Green

Dartmouth's weakness on the track was almost offset by their strength in all of the field events. George Dandrow took first honors in the hammer throw but outside of this, the Green only allowed Technology three points.

Dandrow tossed the hammer a distance of 146 feet to win the event from Weld of Dartmouth and after this tried to break his own Tech Field record of 156 feet, that he made in the Interclass meet earlier this year. Out of his three trials, he fouled twice and only made a distance of 141 feet on the other trial.

Four Tie in Pole Vault

Dartmouth took a clean sweep in the pole vault when the four Green athletes, Jordan, Pope, Sammis and Smith, all tied for first by clearing the bar at 11 feet 6 inches. None of them could beat the mark and it stood at a quadruple tie.

Shelburne Wins Shot Put

Dartmouth's crack sprinter had better luck in the shot put than he did in the dashes. He won easily heating Lee by almost two feet. George Dandrow missed second place by only 1/2 an inch.
