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
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GETS RECESS FOR PARADE

Assign Sections as in Past

All new students entering next fall will be registered as far as possible by mail. There are a larger number of students inquiring about transferring to the Institute than at this time last year. These men will all be assigned sections as their applications are accepted. This work comes under the department of admissions of which Dr. J. L. Tryon is in charge.

Men in the present freshman class have been assigned sections for their Sophomore year. Men in the Sophomore and Junior classes are not assigned sections definitely, but they are expected to arrange themselves in the alphabetical order as indicated on the tabular view.

Registration Not Complete

Each man is to fill out an extra card to be used in making up the directory so that this book may be printed earlier than in the past.

The students will return their address cards before the beginning of the term. The return of this card and the bursar's countersign on the admittance card complete the registration. The time limit for paying the bursar without payment of a fine is Friday, September 30. If for any legitimate reason a man wishes to change his registration, ample time will be given in the first week of the term to do so.

ELECTRICALS HOLD SUCCESSFUL DINNER

100 Men Enjoy Final Banquet of Society—Dr. Elihu Thomson Speaks—Frank Gage Assists In Entertainment

ANNOUNCE NEW OFFICERS

The Technology branch of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers held its annual banquet Tuesday, May 17, at 6 o'clock in the north hall of Walker. One hundred men enjoyed the generous repast.

Immediately following the banquet the officers for the coming year were announced and each officer-elect gave a short speech on the prospects for the coming year. The following are the officers-elect: Chairman, L. R. Tulver '22; Vice-Chairman, Arnold W. Milliken '22; Secretary, Lawrence Codding '22; Treasurer, C. L. Maltby '23.

The first speaker of the evening was C. L. Edgar, president of the Boston Edison Company, who spoke in detail of the new coastwise super-power project. This is to be run from Maine to Maryland and is to get the steam from Pennsylvania, and water-power from the streams of Maine and from the St. Lawrence River. He stated that there was 2,000,000 H.P. in the St. Lawrence at the present time, half of which was controlled by the United States.

Dr. Elihu Thomson of the General Electric Company was the next speaker. To emphasize the fact that electricity was not a dead subject he told of a phenomenon in connection with iron welders. The dust from these welders cannot be detected by the human eye except when placed in the field of a powerful electro-magnet. He also spoke on the connections of the auroras, all of which he has witnessed for the past 30 years, with the sun spots.
