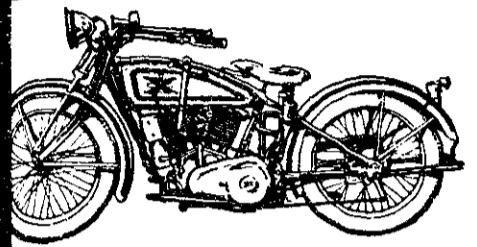

MANY EXPERIENCED MEN BACK

At a recent meeting of the swimming team H. S. Colton '22 was chosen to lead the Institute natators next year. "Babe" has been on the squad for four years and on the team for two years. He has proven a fast man in both the 50 and 100 yard swims and a good gainer on the relay.

Besides Colton, E. C. Palmer '23 will represent the Institute next year in the dashes. The distance swims will be taken care of by C. D. Greene '21 and O. Trowbridge '22. "Bob" Purinton '22 will star for the Institute in the dives, while much is expected of Stalbird '22 in the plunge. Marsh and Dunn, who swam on the freshman team last season, will make the varsity swimmers work to hold their positions in the dash events and the relay.

Swimmers Face Hard Schedule

No meets for next year have as yet been definitely arranged although a tentative schedule has been drawn up. The teams to face the institute next winter will probably include Yale, Brown, Harvard, Annapolis, Dartmouth and Princeton.
