Roll Up 14-0 Score in Opening Contest of Season

TACKLE NAMED CAPTAIN

St. John's Academy alertly gobbled up three fumbles and also the game with the freshman football team, 14-0, last Saturday afternoon. The two Academy scores resulted directly from 25 blunders with the pigskin and on several other occasions poor work with the ball intervened when a freshman score seemed certain.

The climax came near the close of the third quarter after a long series of line smashes put the Engineers on St. John's three yard line. Johnson, Technology quarterback, ripped off the last three on a drive through center only to fumble when safely across. Bertelli scooped up the ball and ran 105 yards for the first Academy score.

With but several minutes to play the second touchdown came in almost as startling a manner. St. John's punted to Carrier who was dropped on the freshman 30 yard mark, fumbling the ball. One of the Academic lads recovered it and on the next play, a long forward pass, the Beaver cubs were put 14 points in the rear.

Coaches of the freshman team while greatly disappointed in the shiftless handling of the ball were surprised by the valiant work, both offensive and defensive, of the line. The team worked very smoothly considering that it had never played together before. The squad is in good physical shape, Johnson and Leonard being the only two warriors badly bumped.

CREWS FOR FIELD DAY MAKE FIRST APPEARANCE ON CHARLES

Real Practice Got Under Way Last Saturday

SOPHS DOWN PROVIDENCE

The Sophomore Field Day football team showed its real wares Saturday afternoon defeating the Providence College varsity, 6-0. The '24 team that made such a peppy appearance in practice came to life with a bang and beat the same eleven that Boston College varsity scored but 25 points on last week.

The entire conflict was a see-saw of line plunging. The Engineers, with their mountainous forward defense, easily had the best of the quarrel, repeatedly making first downs. More scoring was prevented by the frequent penalties and in the early part of the game, by Technology fumbles.

All through the third quarter the Sophomores conducted a steady drive through the Providence line. Lehan started the procession with two six yard smacks at right tackle, and then came back with three and five yard gains through the same hole. All the backs contributed having no difficulty finding openings. By the end of the quarter there was only six yards to travel.

Harry Ferguson romped through center and collected six points in the first play of the fourth period. The goal kick failed by inches striking the cross bar.

Providence looked good for the first minutes and the deception persisted until Possiel tore through center for a 40 yard gain. A couple of penalties halted the attack and for the rest of the half the ball shifted back and forth without decisive results. Coleman consistently was a tower of strength in the line.

Sophomore ends on several occasions failed to catch the Providence quarter as he caught the kicks and let him go for 30 yard journeys. It was slips of this nature that kept the persistent hammering of the line from yielding '24 greater returns.

After the score in the fourth quarter the attack went smoothly to work coming within ten yards of crossing the line before the whistle. The summary:

The freshmen have, at last, come to life, thanks to the mass meeting last week. At 5 o'clock on the day of the meeting, 54 husky freshmen appeared on the field, much to the surprise of Coach A. W. Davenport '23. These new men promptly showed their strength by pulling the rope stake out of the ground. Such a feat ought to give the men more heart for their chances on field day.

BOXING MANAGERS CALLED

Coach Boutillier to Give Lessons Two Days a Week

Candidates for the three freshman Boxing Manager positions will report tomorrow at the A. A. office in Walker any time between 4 and 6 o'clock. The competition will run until January when the three successful candidates will be picked. At the end of the season, two of these will be recommended for the position of Sophomore assistants. The freshman will have an attractive schedule, probably including a trip to St. John's Military Academy at Syracuse, New York.

Beginning Wednesday, Coach Boutillier will be in the boxing room from 9 to 6 o'clock two days a week to give lessons at very reasonable rates to any men wishing to learn to box or improve their style. Coach Boutillier was New England and National Amateur Champion.

The call for freshman and Varsity candidates for the teams will be made Tuesday, November 8. At this time, two novice tournaments, one for the frosh and the other for the upperclassmen, will be opened. No man who has represented Technology in any boxing meet will be eligible.

ADAMS RETURNS TO CHESS TEAM

W. W. Adams '24, who was one of the strongest players on the M. I. T. Chess Team, has returned to the Institute after a year's absence. He entered Technology in 1919, completed his freshman year, but was unable to come back in 1920. His return this year is especially welcomed by the members of the Chess Club.

On the other hand, R. F. Lyon '21, whose skill was considered equal to that of Adams, left the Institute last spring. C. L. Pool '21, Carl Thumin '21, and several other players of considerable ability are also missing.

Although no one except Adams has been found to take their places, Chess seems to be popular this fall, and the Club has many new men of unknown merit. No matches have been definitely arranged yet, but there will be an exhibition meet within two or three weeks, followed by a twenty board match with the Boylston Chess Club. Besides the usual trips, the Team is making arrangements to go to the International Chess League meet in New York, which takes place during the Christmas holidays.

CALIFORNIA CLUB TO BANQUET

The California Club will open its social season today at 6 o'clock by a banquet held in the Faculty dining room of the Walker Memorial. This will also act as the initial meeting of the organization. The banquet is for the purpose of getting the old and new members of the club together, and to discuss plans for the coming year. FAST TIMES MADE AT FALL HANDICAP RUN

Captain Elmer Sanborn Wins with Art Flanders Second—Entry List Large

HARVARD MEET TEAM PICKED

Captain Elmer Sanborn, followed closely by Art Flanders, finished first in the Fall Handicap cross-country run last Saturday. The time of 27 minutes and 28 seconds was very fast for the Franklin Park course. Sanborn captured both the Benson cup for finishing first and the Nye cup for the fastest time over the entire course. His time was 2 minutes and 9 seconds faster than that of last year's captain, Billy MacMahon, over the course a year ago. This is partially accounted for by the fact that the course has been shortened about a quarter of a mile. Billy MacMahon finished third, Bob Hendrie fourth and G. H. Holt, a last year's freshman, fifth according to times. MacMahon is not eligible for the team this year.

Entry List Is Large

There were 105 men to start in this year's handicap of which 14 were freshmen. Of these 39 varsity candidates finished and 10 freshmen. Quite a large number of men got off the course and so were put out of the race.

The three men to make the fastest times are as follows: Elmer Sanborn, time 27 min. 28 sec.; Art Flanders, time 27 min. 37 sec.; Billy MacMahon, time 29 min. 19 sec. G. C. Myrick was the first freshman to finish with the time of 23 min. 13 sec. for the 3 1/2 mile course.

Team Against Harvard Picked

In the meet against Harvard next Friday afternoon Technology will enter 17 men. Of these 12 will run with numbers and five without. These five, while not having a chance to score against Harvard, will be in competition with their team-mates for a permanent berth on the team.
