## FRESHMEN DEFEAT TUFTS WITH FIELD GOAL MARGIN

The freshman football team barely nosed out Tufts '25 Saturday afternoon when quarter-back Johnston drop-kicked the ball through the bars for the only score of the conflict. The elevens were very evenly matched though Technology fumbles were the only reason the frosh didn't succeed in crossing the line. The final count was 3-0.

The winning play came in the third quarter after two periods had been spent in shifting back and forth. The freshmen had hammered their way to the Tufts' 30-yard line and since there seemed to be no chance for further progress Johnston ordered a kick. In spite of the distance and a bad angle the pigskin sailed to the right spot and gave the freshmen the game.

**Technology Near Line Twice**  
 Tufts was saved by the whistle at the end of the first half for Technology '25 held the ball on the visitors'

six yard line and a play or two more seemed enough to put it across. Brockleman, frosh tackle, came within five yards of scoring when he got loose for a 40-yard dash in the last period. The Engineers lost this chance to add six points when Leonard fumbled on the next play. Carrier played a particularly brilliant game throughout being the most consistent plunger that the freshmen called on.

The coaches are quite well satisfied with the brand of football the freshmen are displaying, with the exception of the constant dropping of the pigskin. Fumbles were the outstanding fault against Tufts as well as St. John's a week ago. Tufts also had difficulty in this line and captain Bob Grant did some fast work in scooping up the enemy's errors.

The remaining game on the frosh schedule, before Field Day, is with Andover, away next Saturday. The '25 squad has been very fortunate so far in the matter of injuries and will probably have its full strength available on November 4.

## '24 ELEVEN TRAMPLED BY VETERAN BROWN WARRIORS

Brown's second football team, strengthened by the presence of six varsity men now ineligible for the first eleven, shutout the Sopkomore Field Day outfit on Saturday afternoon, 25-0. A large share of the victory must be credited to Sullivan, one of the Bruin half-backs, who crossed the line for three of the four scores. The absence of Shiplay, Lehan and Ferguson was very noticeable in the '24 machine.

The visiting warriors had a big advantage in the matter of weight and were able to keep the Sophomore attack pretty well under cover. Technology didn't pull any of the spectacular smashes through the line that featured the Providence game. End runs and off tackle plays resulted in the greatest gains for Brown.

**Scores Three Times**  
 Brown scored twice in the first quarter, the first touchdown coming after about three minutes of play. Sullivan circled right end for a run of 25 yards for the opening counter. Later in the period Morley added six points making the longest dash of the fray, 40 yards. Sullivan eluded the '24 backs in the second quarter and again in the last for the other touchdowns.

Fumbling, which was very evident in the Providence game, has been pretty well banished by Coach Woodruff. In the last period the work with the ball was quite ragged, however, and several slips in catching punts cost the Sophomores a great deal of ground. The line again did fine work though the results were not so evident since Brown's forward defense was much too heavy to be easily pushed about. Earl Wilde was particularly alert and his hard tackles broke up many plays.

**Two Backs Out of Game**  
 The backfield was very much weakened by the loss of halfback Lehan and fullback Ferguson. Benny Lehan will be kept out of the game until Field Day with a cracked shoulder while Ferguson will probably play against Lowell Institute next Saturday. The summary:

## DARTMOUTH WINS AT SOCCER

In the first game of the season played Friday afternoon at the Brighton playground, the soccer team lost to Dartmouth, 1-0. Both aggregations showed the need of more practice, but in the opinion of members of the team the Technology eleven played a little better than last year. Luykx, former captain, was unable to be in this game, but it is expected that he will play later in the season.

The Beavers took the offensive in the first half, and held the ball at the opponents' end of the field most of the time. They failed to score, however, as there was considerable weakness and lack of cooperation in the forward line.

In the second half, Technology had the wind in its face, and had to play more of a defensive game. On a penalty, the Dartmouth team failed to score, and immediately after, the Engineers rushed the ball up the field, but again failed to get it through the goal. In the last three minutes of play the Green carried the sphere down to Technology's goal, and made the only score of the game.

The need of practice for the forward line is noticeable. This was the weakness of last year's team, but was remedied toward the end of the season to a large extent.

## FRESHMEN TIE ANDOVER AT SOCCER SATURDAY, 1-1

The freshman soccer team played its first game of the season against Andover and held the Academy team to a tie, 1-1, on Saturday at Andover.

In the first half Technology was on the defense and showed themselves to be in good condition. Rigo scored a goal for the Engineers in this part of the game, and the Institute contingent were unable to score again throughout the rest of the playing.

## CREW RACE STARTS FIELD DAY PROGRAM

### Committee Gives Out Probable Order of Events for November 4

Plans for the coming Field Day, on the afternoon of November 4 are rapidly nearing completion, and the two lower classes are looking forward to the clash that determines which shall hold the position of superiority for the coming year. The Sophomores are determined to win as this is their last chance to get their numerals on the Field Day Cup and the freshmen are equally determined to break the usual precedent, and prevent them from doing so.

The annual Field Day is the outcome of the old custom of a Cane Rush between the classes. Because a man was killed one year in this rush, the Institute authorities decided that that kind of competition could not be used to settle the rivalry of the lower classes. Subsequently, the Field Day was substituted for it, and has become an established custom. This kind of contest has been found to be strictly in accordance with the wishes of the Alumni and Institute authorities, who feel that it is more appropriate to the character of an Institution where men come primarily for a more serious purpose than play alone.

**Embraces Four Contests**  
 Field Day embraces four contests. First, shortly after 1 o'clock the crew race over the one and one-eighth mile course from the B. A. A. boat house to in front of Walker. Then there is the one and one-half mile relay race, 12 men on each team, tug-of-war, for the best two of three pulls, 25 men on each side, and a football game. Immediately after the crew race on Field Day the exercises will begin with a parade of all the four classes led by the Seniors, with the Senior class president, D. F. Carpenter '22, in charge. The parade will form in the Great Court, the Seniors starting from the northeast corner, the Sophomores in Dupont Court and the freshmen in Lowell Court. They will parade to Tech Field where the rest of the contests will take place.

 One hundred yard handicap race between Mike Hoar and W. C. Hull '23.

The particular order of events has been laid out with the intention of making the interest as high as possible all the way through. Of special interest will be the 100-yard race between Mike Hoar and W. C. Hull '23, with a 29-yard handicap for Mike.

**Dine Teams Next Day**  
 At the Field Day dinner which will be held on the Saturday evening following, and to which all members of Field Day teams are invited as guests of the Advisory Council on Athletics, Dr. Rockwell '86 will be the toastmaster. The Council has arranged to have the following men speak: Dr. Rockwell, Dean Talbot, Major Briggs, Bursar Ford, and the Captain of each team. In addition to the officials and competitors there is to be present the Advisory Council, Professor E. F. Miller and Mr. Everett Morss. At this dinner Dean Talbot will present the Cabot Medals, which are

awarded to men taking Institute physical training who show the greatest physical development during the year. It is planned to keep things from any tendency to monotony by limiting speeches to two minutes each. This is to give more time to an enjoyment of the dinner itself. The usual custom of passing the Field Day cup around will be followed, that the dinner may be long remembered for the spirit of fellowship that it is intended to enhance.

**Expect Greatest Day Yet**  
 The committee expects Field Day 1921 to be the greatest yet, but wishes to call attention to the fact that everything depends upon the enthusiasm and interest shown by the student body as a whole, and especially the lower classes, who are primarily interested. They feel that if 1925 wants to win this year that they must show considerable "pep" in the backing of their teams, as they have no doubt that there is material there for some fine teams if the men will only turn out. Although the Sophomores are fairly well organized and are pushing plans for their teams, this applies to them as well. Both sides are working hard to make their teams come through with commendable efforts in the final struggles on Field Day.

## RIFLE CLUB ARRANGES TO USE WALNUT HILL RANGE

Arrangements have been completed whereby the Rifle Club will have this season the use of the Walnut Hill range of the Massachusetts Rifle Association. This will enable the members of the club to practice outdoor shooting at any time, as the range is kept open all winter. The Wakefield range will be available, as last year, but this is closed rather early in the winter. Two members, Sydnor Hall '22, and C. J. Lundborg '22, have been out to Wakefield and find that the range is as good as ever, or perhaps a little better, as there have been some repairs made during the summer. The range is run under the direction of the Marines.

The Rifle Club expects to resume active work within the next two weeks, when new members will be admitted, and definite plans for the coming season arranged. One of the features of the shooting this fall and winter will probably be a contest for individual shooting, which will extend over a month or more, and the winner of which will receive a cup or other prize.
