Harvard Has Big Frosh Squads

Rowing leads with a total of 169 first-year men enrolled. Tennis comes second with 124, and football third. From there on they straggle down to lacrosse with three men out.

BEAVER FIVE EASILY BEATS NORTHEASTERN

Victory Chiefly Due to Fast Work During First Ten Minutes

UNIVERSITY TRAILS, 29-17

Registering a point a minute for the first ten minutes of the battle with Northeastern University Saturday night in Walker, the Beaver quintet started its winter campaign in whirlwind fashion. The Institute outfit won to the tune of 29-17. The attack slowed down rapidly after the initial rush and the playing throughout the second half was by no means encouraging to Technology followers.

"Play for the first quarter of the game showed promise, but the remainder was not so good," is Coach Allen's report. Manager Greenwalt feels confident that the team will have a good season.

Dave Davidson, at left forward for the Engineers was high point man though he had lots of difficulty in caging his shots during the early part of the game. He proved to be a very reliable man on the foul line when he assumed the job at the opening of the second half. Captain Cub Hubbard was the mainstay on the defence and as back guard played a mighty fine game. Captain Robbins, of Northeastern, set his teammates a good example totalling nine points.

Technology Counts First

The first score of the season came to Technology when Tonon netted a foul after a little more than a minute of play. Tony followed with a field goal and then Berney Coleman, the lanky center, scored one and chased it with another on an easy try. After three of his mates had bungled tries Tonon counted again and then added a foul. Northeastern indulged in some very poor shooting and finally got two points on fouls. After this the crimson-jerseyed visitors improved rapidly and play went from one end of the floor to the other with slight results. Cook was sent in for Gyp Blood and later Landis for Tonon.

Second Half Closer

The second half was more or less of a see-saw with the Beavers slowly increasing their lead. Substitutions were numerous on both sides but the addition of new spirit did little to speed up the battle. Last year's runaway which resulted in a 35-18 Institute win, was not repeated but Captain Hubbard's team was never in danger. On the whole the Institute passing seemed to be of higher grade than last winter's. With fairly good shooting the score would have been much higher on both sides for many chances were wasted.

In the opinion of both coaches the game was not rough but the recent intercollegiate rulings were certainly not interpreted in the strictest sense.

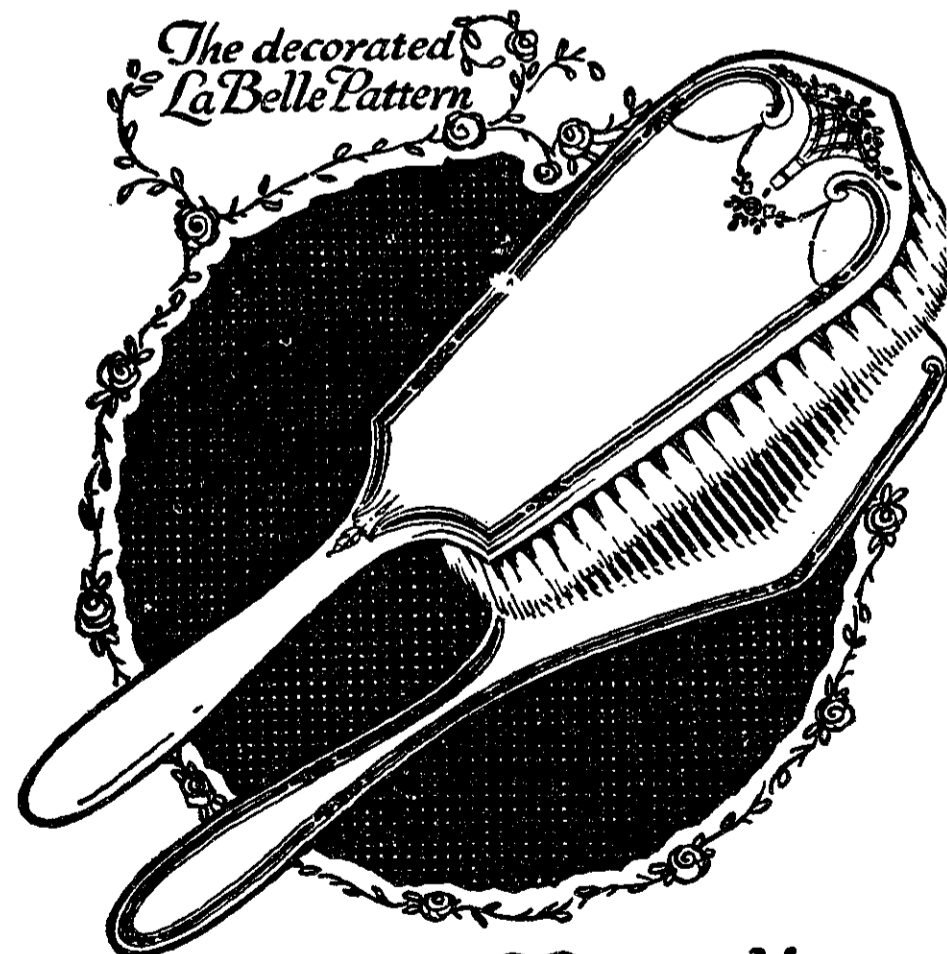
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
