The prompt action of the Sophs in getting things moving this year seems likely to be a direct action toward the establishment of class teams for all the classes. Up to a few years ago, this condition existed at the Institute, but the 1923 freshman team of two years ago was given slight encouragement when they were refused even numerals as recognition of their having played out a fairly successful schedule, and baseball lost some of its grip. However, with the desire for baseball so clearly evidenced this year seems to be a big step in the other direction, and a good season is looked for.

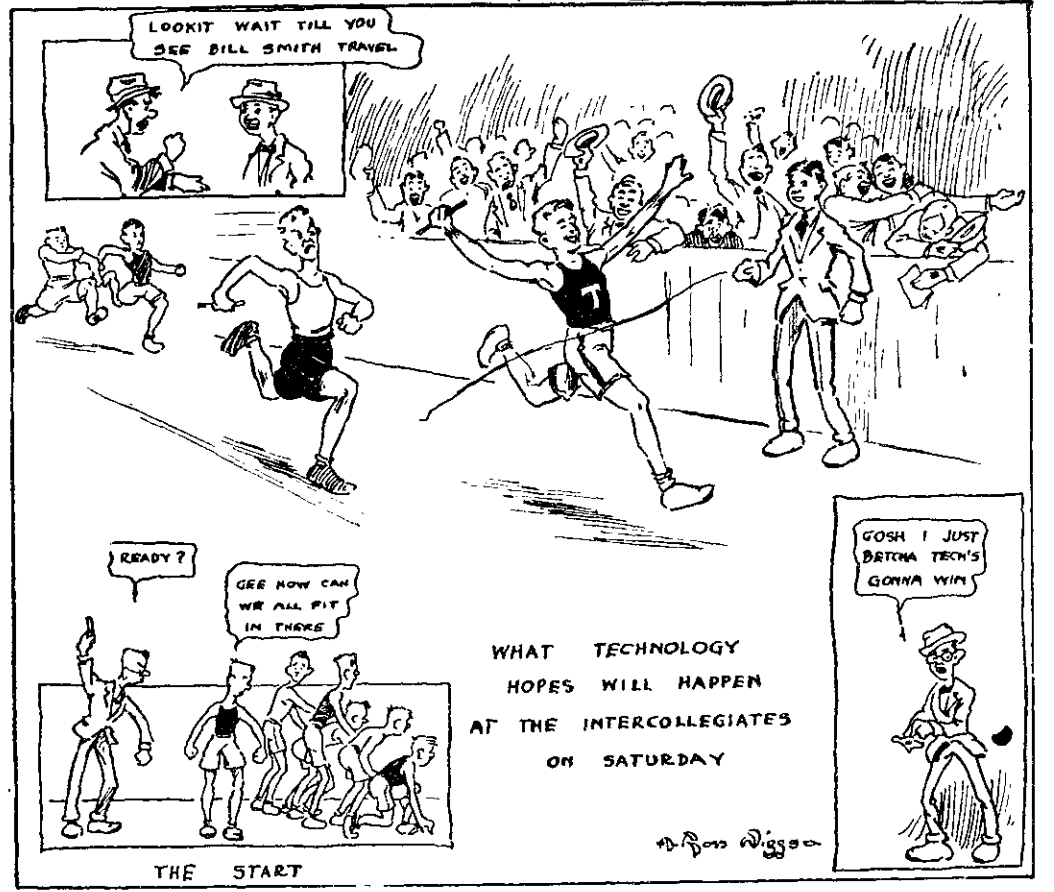
COLLEGE SPORTS NEWS

Since a number of teams have entered which probably will not start at the last minute, Captain Chittick and his quartet won't know all their opponents until they face the gun. Besides those mentioned, U. of Penn, Penn State, and Columbia are credited with fast combinations.

Plan for Spring Season
The rather more lenient weather his week has permitted Coach Kanaly to wind up the training of the varsity relay in fine shape and leaves Captain Chittick's quartet in top form for tomorrow's championship battle. This will be the last important meet of the indoor season and if good weather continues Kanaly will have his men on the cinders shortly after exams are over. Then will come the first of the outdoor events, the spring handicap meet, which gives Coach Kanaly an opportunity to look over his available material and plan for the intercollegiate competition later on.

WEISMULLER EASILY WINS NATIONAL 100

Chicagoan Swims to Victory Last Night over New England Stars

John Weismuller of the Illinois Athletic Club was the feature of the meet held in the Brookline Public Baths last night when he outclassed New England's best swimmers and broke three tank records. In the National Championship 100 yard swim Weismuller bettered the tank record when he finished three yards ahead of Davy Jones of Brown and five yards ahead of Stew Damon of Amherst. His time was 54 seconds. Jelliffe, the Yale star, missed connections at New Haven and arrived late to compete.

Another record fell when Weismuller swam an exhibition 50 yard dash in 24 seconds, nearly a second slower than his best time. To top it all he lowered still another record, taking first away from Ed Muir in the 50 yard back stroke in the fast time of 31 3-5 seconds.

In the Junior National Plunge the Brookline fat man, C. S. Bird, secured first with a float of 73 feet 6 inches. Metzger and Gorman, the two Brown entries securing the other places. John Henninger, the Technology entry, went off his course on every try and only managed to rate fourth.

FROSH BASKETBALL GOES TO ANDOVER

Play Final Game of Season Tomorrow with Prep School Team

The freshman basketball team goes to Andover tomorrow afternoon for the last game of the season, after a very successful winter on the floor. The yearlings have dropped only two games this year, one to Harvard and one to Exeter, both being lost by a single basket. The team has developed rapidly under the guidance of Coach Nelson, and even considering the disadvantage of a late start, has come through with the goods in first class shape. Captain Ed Johnston, who had previous experience with the Williams freshmen, has developed into a clean, fast player, both on offense and defense, and in the coming game with Andover will probably replace Brown at center. Brown has done excellent work all season and has exchanged with Johnston only after a lively competition for the pivot position.

Al Ruff Has Been High Scorer
A good deal of the credit for the scoring done by the team goes to Al Ruff, who has been a big scoring factor in all the games. In the matter of scoring from fouls, Ed Eager has been pretty proficient, his points helping out materially in the totals. The whole team has been working well together as well as developing some good individual players, and it appears that Coach Nelson will hand some well trained men over to the varsity next year. The yearlings are all set for the game with Andover tomorrow; they have been working hard since the last game, and while the absence of the

practice periods with the varsity since the end of the latter's season has slowed them down a bit, they are expected to come across satisfactorily with the prep school. Coach Nelson has decided on the following men for the Andover game: Johnston, Eager, Brown, Hastings, Ruff, Davis, Ingram, and Mitchell.
