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More games of similar nature are planned by the Institute chess team during the remainder of the term. Elections for officers for next year will be held soon, although the exact date has not yet been decided.

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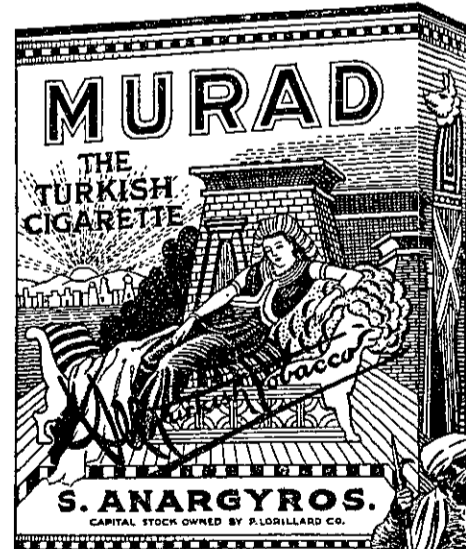
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
