AWARD ALL INSIGNIA AT M.I.T.A.A. DINNER

Annual Banquet Expected to Be Premier Event of Athletic Year

The annual dinner of the M. I. T. Athletic Association takes place in the main hall of Walker Memorial on Tuesday evening, May 16. Dr. A. W. Rowe '01, of the Advisory Council on Athletics, has outlined the plans for the affair and expects to make it one of the biggest of the athletic calendar with an estimated attendance of 350 men. T. M. Taylor '22, president of the Athletic Association, will preside at the dinner. It is expected by the committee that all the athletic coaches will attend the function. Invitations and announcements are being set out this week. The price of tickets will be \$1.50 per man; this includes only the actual price of the dinner and expenses. It is also planned to have both Glee Club and the Choral Society attend to furnish recreation for the evening.

To Award All Athletic Insignia The main purpose of the dinner is to furnish a convenient time for the public award of the athletic insignia and trophies. This includes the presentation of the T charms to new members of the Varsity club, the announcements of record cup winners, and the presentation of the cups to the winners of the interclass meet. Further announcement concerning the award of the Technique cup will also be given out at the dinner.

The complete plans of the affair are not available at present but are expected to be ready in a short time when further information concerning invitations and the sale of tickets will be announced.

AEROS WILL FEATURE BANQUET AND FLIGHTS

New Glider Being Built by the Society Is Almost Completed

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TECHNOLOGY RUNNERS OPEN SEASON AGAINST HARVARD IN DUAL MEET SATURDAY

Contest Will Be Close—Time Trials Complete
Crimson Training—Engineers Ready after Stiff Work Today

When the Institute runners step from the doors of the track house Saturday afternoon to meet the team of Harvard University, they will be facing the climax of six weeks of the hardest sort of practice. Coach Kanaly's men will be on the familiar cinders of Tech Field and, showing the sort of class which has been a regular thing on the oval every afternoon for a month, they will take part in one of the most thrilling contests of the spring season. Harvard is good. The meet will be of the highest order. The winning combination will have an advantage of very few points at the most, and a tie is quite possible.

Time trials which began yesterday and are to continue this afternoon will give Coach Bingham a final line on the Crimson tracksters he will send against Technology while Coach Kanaly, who has already picked his men for the meet, will be content with two more intensive practice periods and a complete rest on Friday to cap the month's work in preparation for the opening of the season.

The clash with Harvard begins what promises to be a strenuous season for the Engineers, with the Navy dual meet, the New England championships, and the I. C. A. A. A. coming on successive Saturdays following. The interclass meet found the Institute athletes in good shape however, and Coach Kanaly has used the last two weeks simply to smooth off the rough spots and keep the men in the best of condition.

Both Teams Work Hard The first two days of the week found both rivals working hard in their practice sessions but the crimson squad has been pushed the hardest with time trials yesterday and today. The disastrous walloping at the hands of the Middies caused Coach Bingham to thoroughly overhaul his machine and the time trials are to determine just which ones of the Harvard track aspirants will come to Tech Field Saturday.

The Engineers have been going through fast work over abbreviated distances in their respective events and Coach Kanaly will continue along this same line today. There will be no actual time trials for Institute men however.

Harvard Loses Sprint Star Vin Chapin has been reported out of it for the rest of the year because of the failure of his old injury, suffered during the indoor season, to get better and his loss will undoubtedly be felt by his team mates. Charlie Wansker, Dennis Chase, Chuck Evans, and Fritz Hovey will be Coach Bingham's chief reliance in the sprints as a result. It is also rumored that Whitney, the crack timber topper for the University will be unable to compete Saturday for he has not practiced for over a week and was known to be suffering from a bad cold when he last worked out.

Coach Working Distance Men Coach Kanaly has been giving particular attention to his distance men the past few days for Harvard is noticeably weak in this department with the exception of Burke the crack miler. Sanborn is picked to fight Billy Burke in the mile though the visitor is conceded to be the favorite but with Leo Poore running well the Engineer mentor hopes to cop second and third while there even better chances for the two mile. Bob Hendrie should have no trouble in winning but the other two places are more uncertain. Flanders had been
