HOLD ANNUAL PICNIC SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Stage Minstrel Show and Dance in Rogers' Main Hall

The Architectural Society of the Institute announces its annual Arts and Crafts, or Spring Exhibition on Friday, May 12, and their annual Picnic on Saturday, May 13.

The Spring Exhibition, which is the chief function in Rogers each year, is a display of the humorous and satirical in the architects' imagination. It is a foolish, nonsensical exhibition, parodying a real serious one in which everybody contributes, relieving all their pent-up emotions and suppressed feelings concerning things artistic as well as academic.

It offers a splendid opportunity to pay off old scores on the Faculty in which the architects have the advantage over the rest of us.

Any student in Course IV is eligible to contribute to the Exhibit and there is no limitation on either the size or the number of drawings from any one artist. Those in the know claim this year's Exhibit surpasses all that have gone before and several surprises are in store for the opening night.

Architects' Voo Doo to Appear

In conjunction with the Exhibit, the Architects' number of Voo Doo will appear about the middle of this month. This number is to be exclusively the work of the students of Course IV, the cover design being by Roger Hayward '22, the designer of this year's Tech Show poster.

The Exhibition is to be preceded by an entertainment in the form of a Minstrel Show presented by the Junior Class on the stage in the Common Room at Rogers. This show will be up to the usual high artistic standard which the Architects maintain in their endeavors and will include a choice collection of songs and dances.

Picnic on Forbes Estate.

Following the Minstrel Show, a dance will be held in the main exhibition hall of Rogers at which the Architects' Orchestra will play. Everybody is freely invited to the Exhibit, the show, and the dance, but the Architectural Society has felt constrained to charge an admission fee of one dollar per couple to cover the necessary expenses. Tickets may be obtained from Mr. George S. Holderness '22, at the Rogers Building at any time or on the night of the dance.

The next day, Saturday, the annual Picnic of the Architects will be held in the afternoon on the estate of Edward Forbes in Cambridge, festivities commencing at one o'clock. A baseball game will be played between the three upper classes to determine the championship of the architectural department. Tennis games will also be played by those interested. Finally an inspection of the house and grounds of this beautiful estate will be made.

With the exhibit and the picnic, the activities of the Architectural Society for the year will be brought to a close.

HOLDS PHOTOGRAPHY BY RADIO FEASIBLE

Will Take Long to Develop the Idea Says Dr. Thomson

Dr. Elihu Thomson, Acting President of the Institute and one of the consulting engineers of the General Electric Company, declared last night that while the proposition of C. Frederick Jenkins to send photographs by radio might be feasible, it would take a long time to develop the idea. "The principle is correct, but it would take as long a time to develop it as it did the sending of photographs by telegraph," said Professor Thomson.

Jenkins is the originator of the system which eliminated blurs from the movie screen, and most of that is done by the spotlight system. He has been able to send the letter "H," one of the most simple, by radio, with light effects forming the structure at the receiving end. It is by the same system that he hopes to send pictures by radio.

"Anything which can be done by wire, either telephone or telegraph, can be done by wireless, as has been demonstrated," said Dr. Thomson. "If it can be done by wire, eventually it will be accomplished by wireless, and that means radio."

Haslam, all of the Chemistry department.

Dr. Parmelee has had practical experience in chemical work, at one time being the chief chemist for a refining plant in Colorado. Combined with this is administrative work as president of the Colorado School of Mines, and editorial work on the Chemical and Metallurgical Magazine. Since 1919 he has been Editor-in-chief of this magazine. This experience makes him well qualified to speak on the subject he has chosen: "The Chemist in Public Life."
