**INTERCOLLEGIATE NEWS**

**Princeton Plans New Chapel**  
Princeton is to erect a new chapel to replace the one burned down two years ago. The new building will be virtually a small cathedral, and will cost close to a million dollars.

**Literary Societies Long Lived**  
Two Literary Societies, organized in 1835 at Wake Forest College, North Carolina, are still in existence and active. They have a joint sinking fund, and are talking of erecting a literary society building.

**Marquette to Have New Building**  
Marquette University has had plans drawn up for a new Science Building. This makes the fourth new building that they have built within the last year. The structure is to cost about \$175,000. Construction is to begin in a month or so.

**Favor No Classes for Seniors**  
Abolishing all regulations for class attendance for Seniors and allowing Juniors cuts equal to one-sixth of total credit hours was recommended in a resolution adopted by the Upperclassmen's Association at the University of Minnesota.

**Iowa to Have New Library**  
Building plans for Iowa State's new library building are now in the hands of Des Moines architects. The building is to cost between \$400,000 and \$500,000, with the possibility of enlargement to a million dollar structure.

**Students Boycott Effective**  
The students' boycott at Iowa City has proved effective in that there has been a reduction of prices at cigar stores, soda fountains and billiard halls. The large theatre is not under the restrictions because of the large overhead expense that it must sustain. The barbers are still holding out.

**Women Prevent Cheering**  
Due to the fact that the co-eds stand in the way of good cheering and backing up of the team from the side-lines, Ursinus College has decided that henceforth the men shall go to the games alone so that they may bend all of their energies in support of the team.

**Shifters Just Reach N. C.**  
The organization which swept the Institute last winter has just worked itself south to North Carolina. The University of North Carolina is at present in the throes of joining up with the organization. It seems that in that part of the country the society is largely being condemned, the claim being that the primary purpose of the order is to promote promiscuous flirting.

**Girls Form Anti-Man Society**  
A group of girls at Goucher College have formed an anti-man society, which, while it tolerantly accepts the fact of man's existence, gives him no consideration as an object of more than passing interest. To join this society, it is only necessary to demonstrate conclusively that one's experience with man has materially destroyed the veil of illusion which has previously clouded one's eyes.

**Frosh Favor Hazing**  
Although the Sophomores at the University of Wisconsin have voted to abolish hazing and have permitted the freshmen to discard their distinctive caps, the first year men have decided to wear the headgear voluntarily. At a meeting held recently, which was attended by 1407 freshmen, the class of 1925 voted to continue wearing the green caps as "a mark of class loyalty to aid the members of the class in becoming acquainted with one another."

**U. of W. Has Ceramics Equipment**  
The installation of four thousand dollars worth of machinery and the ceramics department of the U. S. Bureau of Mines Experiment Station on the Campus of the University of Washington. The ceramics department is now fully equipped for the work of manufacturing and testing ceramic products, such as Portland cement, lime, glassware, and pottery. The ceramics station is maintained by the U. S. Bureau of Mines, and is the only one west of Iowa.

**DR. WIENER INSTRUCTS IN UNUSUAL COURSE**

**Tutors Chess Enthusiasts in Intricacies of New Game**

Dr. Wiener of the department of Mathematics has devised a new scheme for Technology students to fritter away their time. For the past week or two, he has been observed initiating the chess fends into the mysteries of what, for a better name, is popularly called "triangular chess." This game is played on a triangular shaped board with one man playing on each side of the triangle.
