Tickets for the Senior picnic, class dinner, tea dance and Pops night will be placed on sale in the main lobby Monday and Tuesday from 12 until 1:30 o'clock. On Monday Pops tickets will be available only to holders of a blanket ticket as they are to receive the preference but the sale Tuesday will be general.

The entire floor and part of the balcony has been reserved for Alumni and Seniors at Pops night and the price has been set at \$1.50 for each seat at a table. Cardinal and Gray caps are to be distributed and other novelties will be provided. The exact nature of the features on the program has not been decided but it is probable that several musical novelties will be staged.

THIRTY PROFESSORS COLLABORATE IN BOOK

"Tackling Tech" to Deal with
Problems of Student
Activity

L. W. CONANT '21 IS AUTHOR

A book of unusual character is now being edited by a member of the faculty, it being written entirely at the Institute. L. W. Conant '21, is the accredited author of a volume entitled "Tackling Tech," which is designed to help students coming here or to other schools of similar nature. It has been written under the constant supervision of practically every department head in Technology and is probably the first volume ever published in which over 30 professors worked disinterestedly that their students might have the benefit of their experience and observation.

The subject matter treats with every phase of student life from the preparation of exams, to social activities. Organization of time, concentration upon work, taking of notes, health and energy, activities and finances, are all dealt with carefully and completely in separate chapters. The book will have about 160 pages and the complete edition will be on sale next fall.

First of Its Kind in Field

The author is competent to write such a book since he was interested in activities during his undergraduate days. He was a Director and President of Corporation XV, a track athlete, class officer for two years, member of the Technique Electoral Committee, member and assistant leader of the Glee Club, Chairman of the Budget Committee, Treasurer of the Interfraternity Council, Institute Committee and the M. I. T. A. A.

In addition to his own experience as a student and his present contact with undergraduate activities as a member of the faculty, Mr. Conant has had the aid of prominent business men who have gladly given their advice in the editing of a volume which will prove a real aid to college men.

NEW ENGLAND TRACK MEET DRAWS COLLEGE TEAMS TO WORCESTER

Will Find B. C. Strongest Opponent in Struggle
for Sixth Straight Win—Run Off Trials
Today and Finals Tomorrow

This afternoon Technology's track team will fire the opening guns in its battle to win the New England Intercollegiate Track and Field Championship for the sixth successive time. The chance for victory lies almost equally between Coach Kanaly's men and Boston College. The latter has individual stars to gain its points while Captain Chittick leads a better balanced team for the Institute and will place his hopes on securing a number of second, third and fourth places. Williams, Brown, Bowdoin, and Wesleyan will hotly contest each event but the Maroon and Gold or the Cardinal and Gray alone can reasonably count on the championship.

TECHNOLOGY CREWS RACE IN NEW YORK

First and Second Eights Meet
Columbia University
Tomorrow

SEATING KEPT UNCHANGED

Two of the Institute shells left for New York last night and the first two Technology eights will follow them at 10 o'clock this morning for the races with Columbia University on the Harlem tomorrow afternoon. This is the first time the Engineers have rowed the Blue and White oarsmen, and it seems probable that the introduction will be a rather strenuous affair for Coach Stevens' crews.

While the varsity boats race in New York the 150 pound crews will provide a little excitement for stay-at-homes in its contest with two Harvard outfits, one of varsity men and the other of freshmen. The 150's trimmed the third Technology varsity by three lengths on the Charles last Saturday and is composed of veterans who should give a good account of themselves.

The second freshman will meet the second and third Harvard freshman. Since the second University frosh rowed an excellent race a week ago, trimming the first Engineer yearlings by three open lengths this contest wears a distinctly crimson aspect. The one mile course will be travelled in both these races.

On the Harlem the varsity will cover a mile and a half instead of the customary one and seven-eighths. This ought to prove of more benefit to the Technology athletes than to the Columbians, since Coach Jim Rice's men have showed a strong finish over the longer course in their races with (Continued on Page 6)

E. E. SOCIETY HOLDS BANQUET ON TUESDAY

Dr. Bush of Research Laboratory Will Address Members
at Annual Dinner

The Electrical Engineering Society will hold its annual banquet next Tuesday, at 6 o'clock, in north hall of Walker. The affair will be open to all students in electrical courses and everyone is being asked to attend, as a live time is promised to all.

Dr. Vannevar Bush, acting director of the Research Laboratory of the Electrical Engineering Department, will be the principal speaker and will have something of interest to tell the members. Music will be furnished by Frank Gage '22, who will sing and play a variety of instruments, and Leslie D. Price '22, who will play the violin. The officers elected for next year will be announced in a novel manner during the course of the banquet.

The price of tickets is \$1.25 per plate for members which is less than cost, since the society is paying the difference from its surplus funds. For non-members, the price will be \$1.50.

When Technology won the New England championship five years ago and started its run of victories, Boston College was hardly even in the fight, but the Maroon and Gold has gradually increased in strength until this year it will make a particular strong bid to oust the Institute from its position of leadership. A single glance is sufficient to mark out the two rivals as the real contenders for supreme honors. Brown, Bowdoin, Williams, and Wesleyan will provide stars who will shine in certain events but the only teams with all round power enough to make them possible champions are those of Technology and Boston College. Bowdoin, the winner of the State of Maine's title, has a more evenly balanced team than the rest of the runners up but lacks the stars necessary for winning points.

Odd Points May Settle Meet

A few odd points picked up here or there in an unexpected fashion by some college without a chance for winning itself may upset one of the leaders and swing the championship to the other big rival. An intercollegiate meet is always more or less a matter of stars while a dual contest depends wholly upon the general power of the contending aggregations. Judging from this viewpoint Technology looks better than Boston College for a possible dual clash but in the larger field the Engineer's better balanced team which is lacking in outstanding stars will have a good deal of difficulty dragging a win out of the fire.

Maroon and Gold Has Three Firsts

Past performances of the athletes rates B. C. at least three first places while the Institute can be equally sure of only one. For the Heights' combination Driscoll will annex the quarter, Bell, the shot put, and Kirtley, unless his team mate Caffrey gets back into the game, the half mile. For the Engineers, Elmer Sanborn is counted on for five points in the mile. The pole vault may possibly (Continued on Page 6)
