won by inches coming up from behind in the last quarter lap. The conflict was particularly interesting to Technology men because Bob Hendrie played such a spectacular and plucky part in the chase.
 Hendrie went out in front on the first bend but was passed on the back stretch by N. P. Brown, one of the favorites from Cornell. The order at the first quarter was Brown, Hendrie, and Baker, and the time an even minute. Hendrie jumped past the Ithaca on the second round and had travelled his half in 2 minutes 7-4-10 seconds. He was leading Baker by 15 yards and the Bates star had flashed by Brown. Brown again came up and passed both of them and for the next three laps the battle was a succession of see-saws with Hendrie in front fully his share of the time. The mile was timed in 4 minutes 44 seconds and the one and one-half in 7 minutes 13.8 seconds. Bob was in the fight until the last three quarters of a lap, when the Bates marvel went past him and stayed ahead. Hendrie had run a wonderful race and was fighting every bit of the way to the tape. He was just shut out of scoring coming in sixth. Higgins, who had been left in the discard by all forecasters chased Baker, caught him and raced shoulder to shoulder with his smaller opponent down the stretch. Just at the finish line he managed to lunge across to a victory.
