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cooking medium instead of boiling water, as is generally used. The men doing the research came to the conclusion that that manner of cooking removed the least amount of nutrient from the vegetables, etc. The use of water in the cooking of meats seemed to tend to harden the albumin which the meats contained more than did the use of low pressure steam. This hardening makes the meats less easily digested, and so more liable to cause trouble.
