TECHNOLOGY REVIEW APPEARS OCTOBER 25

Size, Cover Design and General Arrangement Have Undergone Change

NO LONGER A QUARTERLY

The year's first issue of the Technology Review is scheduled to make its appearance on October 25, and is dated for the month of November. A varied collection of articles will be found between the covers, among those of chief interest being: "The Ascendancy of Gerard Swope '95, to the Presidency of the International General Electric Company, Inc.," by L. H. Whitney, non-resident member of Chemical Research; another by E. P. Warner '17, entitled "Flying Through Europe"; a third by A. W. Rowe on "The Tech Experiment"; and a fourth on "The Springfield Bridge," by Professor C. M. Spofford, '93.

Published Eight Times a Year

During the summer the publication underwent a change of control; Professor R. E. Rogers relinquished the editorship to E. F. Hodgins '22, who is now managing editor, and H. E. Lobdell '17, editor. Professor Rogers, however, continues his connection with the publication in the capacity of contributing editor.

The editors have instituted a number of radical innovations such as a different size and cover design, a change in general arrangement and an increased frequency of issue. The Technology Review is now a monthly magazine, being published eight times a year, from November to May inclusive, and in July.

It is hoped to rouse the interest of the undergraduates through the printing of articles on athletics, publications, and other student activities, though these would be of no less interest to the alumni. There will be a limited sale to meet the undergraduate demand.

TECHNIQUE CANDIDATES MEET THIS AFTERNOON

Juniors, Sophomores and Freshmen Are Eligible for Competition

M. I. T. RADIO STATION IS OPEN FOR TRAFFIC

Messages Transmitted Free to Any Part of the U. S. or to Honolulu

The M. I. T. Radio Society announces that it will accept messages from any students at Technology for transmission free of charge, to any part of the United States or the Hawaiian Islands. Messages may be given to any of the operators, or may be telephoned to University 8502-W any evening between 7 and 10 o'clock.

Prompt delivery of these messages to their destinations is assured by the fact that the Technology station has consistent communication with the south and the middle west. It is also expected that the Institute station will have two-way communication with England and probably with France this winter.

Regular Night Service Handled

At present there is no station in England which is capable of transmitting across the Atlantic, but a college in Manchester has been given permission to use high power, and arrangements have been made with Mr. P. D. Pearson for this communication with England. Mr. Pearson was the official observer representing the English amateurs in the Transatlantic Tests which were held last winter.
