ACTIVITIES APPROVE OBSERVANCE OF DAY

See Promotion of Technology
Spirit as Result of
Innovation

SEEK STUDENT SUPPORT

For the first time in the history of the Institute, an "Hello Day" is about to be observed here at Technology. Conceived with the purpose of promoting a spirit of good fellowship and of making for the greater success of the All-Technology Smoker, the establishment of Friday as "Hello Day" has come as the result of the action of the Smoker Committee.

Smoker Committee Takes Action

"Hello Day," as observed by other colleges, has made it possible for the individual to increase the number of his acquaintances by addressing those with whom he comes in daily contact, but with whom he is not on intimate terms.

The idea of establishing an "Hello Day" so that the acquaintanceships within the class can be increased, has been under consideration on various occasions. The All-Technology Smoker Committee in subscribing to adopting the project feels that it should do much to provide the proper background for the smoker on Friday night.

The final decision upon the subject was reached by the committee at a meeting held late yesterday afternoon, when that body went on record "as favoring the designation of Friday, October 13, as 'Hello Day,' and as desiring to urge the student body to cooperate in making the day a success.

Think It Will Aid Freshmen

At a recent meeting of the heads of the activities at which the project was under discussion, the point was made that the proper observance of such an occasion would not involve the greeting of everybody that one passes in the corridors. It was stated that the greatest benefit could be derived from the strengthening of casual acquaintances, and the substituting of a greeting for the cold and distant nod. The idea was also brought out that it might prove of value in the organization of the Class of 1926, since it would afford an opportunity for the freshmen to meet their fellow classmates. The plan of having "Hello Day" on the same day as the All-Technology Smoker was heartily endorsed by the entire meeting.

The setting aside of a day for one special purpose is not a new one. It was made use of to a marked degree during the war and has been in vogue in the various colleges.

The first gathering of the Choral Society of Technology this fall will be next Monday, October 15, at 5 o'clock in room 5-330. Mr. Stephen Townsend, director of the society's chorus last year, will again take charge and coach at the rehearsals.

The Choral Society was started at the beginning of the last college year to form a body in which both the undergraduates and the alumni might get together with a common interest. Several concerts were given and present plans extend the program farther this season.

About 200 men are wanted and all interested are urged by the management to come to the first meeting. Practice will be but one night a week, as last year.

LARGE SAVING OFFERED BY PURCHASE OF BOOKS

R. H. Kean '23, Assistant General Manager of the Tech Engineering News, will interview personally candidates for the Staff between 4 and 6 o'clock this afternoon in room 27, Walker Memorial basement. The management states that the present call for new men is issued principally because of the loss of 1922 men at graduation, and also because of the growth of the magazine and its membership in the E. C. M. A. About 25 of the candidates will be admitted to the Staff, 15 to fill vacancies, and ten to compensate for the growth.

Among the openings, opportunity for those interested in treasury work is offered directly under the Business Manager. TECH SHOW WILL PERFORM IN NEW YORK THIS YEAR

Announce Competition Leading
to Positions in All
Departments

MANUSCRIPTS OF BOOKS
ARE DUE OCTOBER 23

Smoker for Writers of Music
and Lyrics Will Be Held
Early in November

For the first time in its history, the "Tech Show 1923" will take a New York trip this year. The management has reserved the Waldorf-Astoria hotel for two performances on March 20. They will make a two day trip, and will probably show at Poughkeepsie on the evening of March 19. This latter date has not yet been definitely arranged as yet, but will probably be arranged later. This trip will take place during the two-day recess immediately following the final examinations of the Winter term. This undertaking is one that has been talked of for many years, but this is the first year that the management has been able to bring it about.

The regular Boston performances will take place during Junior week, as usual. There will be three shows on April 19 and 20, with the customary Northampton trip on the 21st.

Manuscripts Due October 23

Candidates are wanted for all managerial departments of Tech Show. Sophomores are needed to take part in a competition for positions on the business staff. The competition that is open to freshmen leads to positions in the business department, the publicity department, stage direction, and orchestra management. Candidates for these competitions are asked to report at the Tech Show office on the third floor of Walker at 5 o'clock today. The management is aiming to make the scholarship record of the competitor one of the determining features in the competition. Candidates for positions on the orchestra itself will be called out sometime next week.

Smokers to Be Held in November

The manuscripts of Show Books are due at the office of Tech Show on Monday, October 23, at 5 o'clock.

Two smokers will be held by the show this fall. The first, to be held during the first week in November, will be for men planning writing the Music and Lyrics for the Show. The general type of songs desired will be explained and other suggestions along that line will be made. The second, The General Show Smoker, at which tentative selections of men for the cast, chorus, and ballet will be made, is to be held about November 20.
