

## Freshmen Tackle Jumbo Youngsters on Tech Gridiron

The scrappy frosh eleven will mix with Tufts '26 at Tech Field tomorrow afternoon in their first game of the season. The Tech men will make a valiant effort to cross the Tufts' goal line, a feat which the Sophomores were unable to accomplish last Saturday.

Scrimmage was held on Wednesday afternoon with two full teams on the field. Several of the men were on the hospital list afterwards as a result of minor injuries sustained in the rough and tumble of the afternoon. In order to have the men in tip top shape for the Tufts' affair the first frosh coach ran the elevens through signal practice only yesterday afternoon. A light workout will be held this afternoon.

The Sophomore team of this fall is practically the same as the one of last year which took the 1924 team into camp by a score of 7 to 0, the only victory for the frosh on Field Day. Last Saturday they battled the Tufts frosh to a scoreless tie.

Phil Carrier, star of last year's Field Day game, has been missing from the Soph lineup this week because of a kick in the stomach during one of the scrimmages. An ankle injured during high school days is also causing him some worry.

The Sophs have up to this time been unable to arrange a game for tomorrow and unless something is done today, they will be on the sidelines to pick holes in the frosh makeup. The game is going to be an excellent indicator of the comparative strengths of first and second year elevens.

## Play Clark Soccer Team

Technology's soccer team will open its season against an eleven from Clark College at Worcester, on the Brighton Playground field tomorrow afternoon. The battle will start at 3 o'clock. The entire Engineer squad was put through its last stiff work on the scene of tomorrow's contest yesterday afternoon. Last year Clark lost to Technology by a 1 to 0 count.

The coaching staff had not completed its choice of the varsity combination last night but it was announced that the following are almost certain to be nine of the 11 starting: Duvai, Atahualpa, Kurzman, Ruiz, Oon, Sun, Roit, Souza, and Captain Macorra.

## TWENTY-SIX '26 RUNNERS BATTLE WIND IN TRIALS

### Field Day Relay Candidates Travel 220 for Time Wednesday

Despite the chilly blasts which swept over Tech Field Wednesday afternoon, twenty-six members of the freshman relay squad went through their preliminary 220 yard trials, giving Coach Kanaly an idea of the speed he can expect from the frosh runners.

Weather conditions, which resembled those of a day in December rather than the middle of October, greatly handicapped the freshman speedsters, but in spite of this draw back the results were on the whole satisfactory. The men had no practice running against a stiff breeze with the temperature so far below normal, and consequently it is quite natural that the trials were a little behind those of former years.

Since all but five of the '26 candidates reported, the coach has an accurate idea of the material available for the Field Day team. His report states that although the Sophomores have several veterans to depend upon, the freshmen have shown a scrappy disposition and should offer a good contest on November 3.

The final choice of the runners will not be made until next Wednesday when the final try outs are to be held, and if the weather conditions are better than they were for the preliminaries the true ability of the men will be determined. Several new sprinters have reported and shown themselves adept on the cinders, but Coach Kanaly is not giving out any of the names of the yearlings' best bets so that no pre-contest dope on their rivals can be obtained by the Sophomore forces.

## BREEZE AIDS SOPH RELAY CANDIDATES IN FIRST TRIALS

### New Men Bid Fair to Push 1925 Veterans for Team Berths

With slightly better weather conditions prevailing than the preceding day, the candidates for the Sophomore relay team were put through their preliminary trials yesterday at Tech Field. Thirty-one men of the Soph squad were timed and although the chilly winds still were blowing across the field, the day was better suited for getting times than the day the frosh were given their first tryouts. The average time of all the men was lower than the times of the trials last year, and the Soph runners will have to do some hustling to keep up to the standards of former seasons. The final trials will be held next Thursday and if the Sophomores are to capture the relay on Field Day, they will have to cut down their clocking considerably. More new men are reporting daily for the frosh squad which means that the Sophs will have no snap in winning this event.

**Veterans in Trials**  
Although Bateman, last year's team captain, and Makepeace, another veteran, were unable to take part in the trials due to slight injuries received in practice, a number of veterans competed. Brown, Milano, Boardman, Russell, Norton, and Campbell all turned in times which make them strong bidders for Field Day team positions.

A number of new men put up a showing which will cause all members of last year's outfit to exert themselves in order to win a place for Nov. 3rd's contest. Mahoney, one of last season's subs, gave promise of making this year's team, and Brewster showed a marked improvement in yesterday's trials. Miller and Hoxie, a transfer from Amherst, also exhibited their ability to cover the cinder track in good time. With such keen competition among the candidates, Coach Kanaly may need this week before the finals to judge who deserves the right to represent the Sophomores after the trials are run off next week.

## Crimson Seeks Win in Deciding Game with Kentuckians

Two years ago the Crimson turned back the pride of Dixie by a score of 31 to 12, but last fall Bo McMillin's famous run gave the Southerners a hard earned 6 to 0 win. This year Bo is gone but Red Roberts, Herb Covington and others of the same calibre are out for blood. Likewise the Uni-

versity isn't resting easy if recent secret practice at Cambridge means anything. When North meets South in the Stadium tomorrow some of the battles of the Civil War won't have anything on what occurs.

### Each Team Has Vets

Twelve of the Centre squad have been in action against the Crimson, five of them having played twice in the stadium. Harvard on the other hand has on her roster thirteen men who faced the Southern onslaught in 1921, of which number four were partners in the 1920 victory. With such an array of veterans on both sides of the scrimmage line the fact that tomorrow's game is for the deciding one out of three assumes even more significance.
