

STRATTON INTENDS NO GREAT CHANGES

Believes Institute Provides
Highest Type of
Engineer

APPROVES OF ATHLETICS

Dr. Stratton states that he comes to Technology as the new President, with an open mind free from ideas of reform. He says that he entertains no thoughts of any radical change in the administration or curriculum. The Institute is well known to him and his opinion is that the methods followed so far have shown that they are conducive to turning out the highest type of technical men. He will try to relieve the dormitory condition.

Athletics, in conjunction with studies, have always interested him, although he has not had the time to participate in them as much as he should like. Activities are, therefore, expected to thrive under his leadership here.

Has Broad Experience

When he was studying in the University of Illinois his greatest ambition was to come to Technology. Not until he was 61 years old were his hopes realized. One of his instructors, Prof. Peabody, was a Technology man. He was the man who first gave Dr. Stratton an unusual interest in the Institute.

Dr. Stratton is a student. He has worked out the most efficient standardizing systems in the testing of materials. This places him in the category of world leaders. Besides his academic training, and subsequent training and broad experience, Dr. Stratton comes to Technology with an invaluable asset to the head of such an institution—his understanding of men. There is an inspiration, he says, in seeing a young mind develop, and the young men who are working for him in Washington are boundless in their praise of his judgment moderation and instruction.

Dr. Stratton a Man of Action

All of Dr. Stratton's associations with men have been of the most peaceful nature. While he was in the University of Chicago he was noted for his popularity. Even now most of his acquaintances speak of him affectionately as "Sammy." He is a member in Washington of the Cosmos Club, the Chevy Chase Club and the Army and Navy Club. 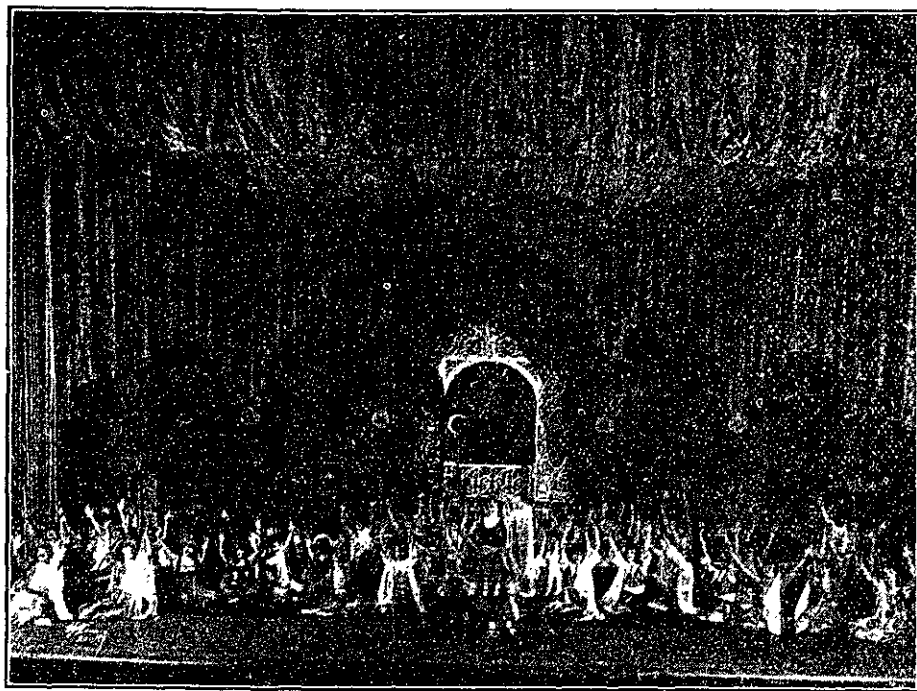
FIRST HYGIENE LECTURE IN ROOM 10-250 TODAY

Dr. A. E. Kennelly, of the Electrical Engineering Department, who is co-operating with the Radio Society, recommends that as many members as possible obtain Commercial Licenses. He believes there are many men able to qualify for a license who haven't done so.

That the M. I. T. radio station provides valuable experience for commercial radio work in handling traffic was shown early Monday morning, when 21 messages were transmitted in a bunch, without repeating, to Chicago, in just an hour.

WORK ON GYMNASIUM PROGRESSING RAPIDLY

New Laboratory Building to
Be Completed by
Next Term

Work on the new gymnasium is proceeding satisfactorily. At present, this consists in laying foundations and sewer connections, but other work will soon be started. The other building under construction, the new laboratory, is also coming along well and will probably be ready for use by the beginning of next term.

According to Major A. S. Smith, the Superintendent of Buildings and Power, this latter building is practically finished. However, it will not be ready for some time since, the equipment is yet to be installed. It is expected that the building will be opened by the first of next term.

The foundations of the addition to the track house and of the heating plant are being laid at present. Wires have also been installed for the purpose of running a circular saw and a pipe cutting and threading machine. This work is to be done in the hangar instead of in the power building in order to save the time that would be required in carrying materials back and forth.

T. C. A. LAUNCHES ANNUAL FINANCE CAMPAIGN TONIGHT

Association Depends Entirely
on Contributions for
Support

\$2000 NEEDED FOR 17 DEPARTMENTS THIS YEAR

Begins Among Undergraduates Tomorrow—Dorms and Frats Today

This evening the annual campaign for finances instituted by the Technology Christian Association will get under way in the dormitories and fraternity houses, and tomorrow it will be started by the various units among the student body. A budget has been planned to meet the needs of the seventeen divisions and the organization calls on the undergraduates to aid in maintaining its important place in the student's life at Technology.

The money collected in this campaign is to be used only for the upkeep of the departments serving the undergraduates. The overhead expenses are taken care of by the Advisory Board of the Association. The departments, however, depend solely on contributions from the students made during the finance campaign and throughout the year.

Budget Lists 19 Items

The Finance Committee has drawn up a budget of the probable expenses for this year's work, and to carry out their program it will be necessary to raise \$2000. The items of the budget get are as follows:

An idea of the use to which this money is put may be had from the service rendered by the Association last year. Rooms were furnished 1200 Technology men; 2000 Handbooks were distributed containing information about Technology and the surrounding community, \$10,130 worth of books were sold to and for students; 21 men served weekly as leaders in Boys' Work; 26 churches in the vicinity were furnished with names of students at Technology of their denominations. Many other services might be added to the list, all of which depend on voluntary contributions for their support.
