

Capt. Cook Directs Large Squads in Practice Until Coach Arrives

Basketball practice is going on smoothly every day in spite of the fact that no coach has been secured as yet. The largest crowd of men ever seen on the floor is reporting for the Varsity and freshman teams. Captain Cook is still in charge and has the candidates at work on important fundamentals of the game—passing and shooting. There is an abundance of material on hand from which to pick the squads and the positions will be hardly contested. With practically all last year's regulars back, a veteran five can be put on the floor but the ability shown by several of the new candidates will make these veterans hustle to hold their positions. and Captain Cook of the 1921 Varsity. Sawyer, one of last year's subs, Metcalf, Skinner and Wickham are showing up well in practice.

Frosh Have Big Squad

Higgins and the collegio Columbia. Now we notice that last Saturday Columbia trimmed Cornell in cross country, by the decisive score of 33 to 57 while Dartmouth trailed Moakley's men by a single point and U. of Penn was left in the lurch with 69. The individual winner was the same man who showed up Buker, and his time was worth noticing.

We had almost overlooked the fact that Columbia has a team in the I. C. A. A. A. cross country run but after hearing the results of Saturday's contest we are keenly aware of our error. Situated where her harriers can train almost daily over the Van Cortlandt Park route and possessed of a leader like Higgins Columbia is a dangerous foe for any team. This adds a second name to that of Princeton posted in the list of highly respected opponents of the Engineers for the championship.

Cornell is more seriously handicapped by the loss of Captain Kirby than was expected. The replacement of their fifth scoring man by a runner of undoubted abilities of Kirby would make a considerable difference in the Red team's scores. If Cornell regains the services of her injured leader before the Intercollegiate at Van Cortlandt some of the people who have considered Moakley's outfit as out of the race would have to revise their estimate.

We noticed in the list of Bowdoin entries the name of F. H. Plaisted and we are told that he is one of the best the Maine college has. This is not surprising to anyone who remembers Plaisted's work while he was at the Institute. Coach Kanaly said he was a very promising miler when he wore the Cardinal and Gray and that he was sorry to lose his services when he transferred.

Maine, Bates, and New Hampshire State form the trio that will offer the Engineers the biggest opposition in the New England Saturday. New Hampshire is a dark horse with little definitely known about her. Maine has defeated Bates in the State championships, so it looks like the field can be narrowed down to these two. Personally we can't see anything but Captain Hendrie's combination for the winner, but Coach Kanaly said the other day, "I greatly respect the University of Maine team" and the Institute coach never was a pessimist. If he recognizes in the Pine Tree State outfit a dangerous opponent it would be an error to overlook it. Maine upset predictions and won by fighting spirit last year and Coach Kanaly is intending to take no chances through underestimating his rivals.

Find Majority of Gym Turn Out Ineligible Due to One Year Rule

The influx of candidates for the Institute gym team to the third floor of Walker Monday, in response to the call for material, seemed rather promising until it was found that they were for the most part new men at Technology, and hence not eligible for varsity work till next season. The absence of several members of last season's team leaves quite a number of positions open for upperclassmen, especially on the high bar and on the tumbling squad.

Norman Apollonio, who shared honors with Jack McCoy on the parallels last season, will not be with the team again, having recently finished his course at the Institute. Several of the frosh candidates are showing up well on the bars, making prospects good for next year's outfit, but furnishing no material for the present varsity.

Coach Hincks was on hand last Friday to meet the new men, and will begin his regular workouts with the team next Monday.

The question of eligibility may hit the team's high bar squad hard, for the "powers that be" in Institute athletics are still undecided about Way Bailey.

Dr. Rowe Will Open Technology Hockey Season at Meeting Friday

Games Tentatively Arranged with Dartmouth, Army, Yale, and Princeton

Varsity and freshman hockey gets its start Friday afternoon when the opening meeting of the year will be held in room 10-267 at 5 o'clock. Dr. Allan W. Rowe '01, of the Advisory Council on Athletics, will open the meeting, as is customary at the start of the hockey season, and will be followed by Captain Herb Hayden, Manager Fletcher, and the newly chosen hockey coach, whose name is not to be divulged before the meeting.

Strong Schedule Planned

An excellent schedule is under consideration at present, including games with West Point, Princeton, Yale, and Dartmouth, all of them being played away from home, in addition to several fast contests on the Boston Arena ice. The Dartmouth game as planned will be one of the Winter Carnival features, as it was last year, and the addition of Harvard, Boston College, Boston University, Mass. Aggies, and several other contests for the home games makes the list especially attractive.

Only Two Veterans Lost

It is not definitely known how many of last year's squad will be available this year, but since Johnny Duvernet and Hal Wilbur are the only members of last winter's team who have graduated, it is expected that a strong nucleus will be available for the new coach to start with. The men who have come up from the freshman teams of the past two years should also count heavily in filling in the gaps.

Practice will be held at the Boston Arena three or four times each week, beginning about December 1, and arrangements have been made tentatively for practice games early in the season as preparation for the Army game at West Point in January, second date on the schedule.

Last Year's Record Good

The record of last year's Varsity, consisting of four wins and seven defeats, does not look good on paper, but is not in any way a fair indication of the real prowess of the team. Harvard, Brown College, and the Westminster Club, among others, proved too fast for the Institute sextet, but wins against Dalhousie University, the champion of the Provinces, Mass. Aggies, and Yale, proved that the team was up against combinations that were among the best in the East. This year's prospects seem good for a winning team, but the Friday meeting will be the best indicator of what may be expected.

ADMISSION TO STACKS IN LIBRARY BY CARDS

Freshman and Sophomore candidates for the competition leading to boxing manager are to report in the M. I. T. A. A. office at 5 o'clock this afternoon.

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
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
