

**TREMAINE DEFEATS RUSSELL IN FINAL FALL TENNIS MATCH**

**Captain Decisively Wins though Rallies Make Play Interesting**

Varsity Captain L. L. Tremaine defeated J. E. Russell in the three sets of the final match of the first fall tennis tournament ever held at Technology, by scores of 6-2, 6-1, 6-2. Though Russell didn't capture a large number of games he managed to make Tremaine show his best throughout the contest, the count standing at deuce very frequently.

Five rounds of the tournament, which started shortly after the opening of school left Lyman Tremaine and Joe Russell, who played on the

freshman team, as the final competitors. Greater experience, combined with more certainty and speed on the deciding placement shots, gave the Engineer captain the victory. Many of the points were battled for very warmly, the ball going back and forth in long rallies, with both men waiting for an opening. Joe played a steady game and should be a prominent entrant in the contest for varsity positions in the spring.

The management reports that the tournament was so successful that it will be established as a regular thing on the Technology sport schedule. It is proposed to have a cup, which will be held each year by the victor, and also a small replica of the cup which will be awarded permanently to the winner.

An attempt is being made to arrange for the use of the new basketball floor, in the hangar, as an indoor tennis court in the spring. Due to the length of time required to prepare the outside surfaces practice is often seriously delayed. The varsity men could do some very valuable preparatory work indoors if a court were available.

**Talk on Industrial Relations Arranged for Third Smoker of Year**

Professor Freeland is the professor of business management at the Institute.

These certificates may be obtained from him at any of the smokers of the society, or during his office hours in the Combined Professional Societies room.
