Undergraduates News Association Seeking Men for Next Year

COMPETITION THIS WINTER

The Technology Press Club, seeking men to carry on its work next year, is holding a meeting of its staff and candidates this afternoon at 5 o'clock on the East Balcony of Walker. J. S. Ward of the Boston Globe is expected to address the meeting, which is to be short and informal, and H. L. Bond '23, general manager of the Press Club will outline the projected work of the organization and detail the competitions that are to be run this winter, and which are open to Juniors and Sophomores only.

Men who have had some experience in news work will be delegated to assist members of the association in collecting their regular news, while those who have less experience will have an opportunity to learn the journalistic requirements of the club by writing despatches for the smaller city papers not covered by a regular correspondent under the supervision of members.

Technical Journal Work

In addition to regular news work, the Technical Journals department, under the direction of T. M. Nevin '24, will provide work for men who are interested in distributing research information and current scientific and technical news to the professional engineering periodicals.

The Press Club, which is an undergraduate association of the working writers and correspondents of the various Boston papers is a development of the Press Association organized last year. As the positions of almost every member of this year's organization must be filled by new men next year, the present competition is expected to provide the training necessary.

LARGE AUDIENCE HEARS CLUBS' LYNN CONCERT

Single Tickets Sold for Fall Dance—G. F. Cook '23 New Banjo Leader

The Lynn concert of the Combined Musical Clubs, held last Monday evening, was considered by the management to be much more successful than the first one of the season at the Franklin Square House. It was held in the hall of the Lynn Classical High School under the auspices of the Lynn Educational Association.

Although there was no dance following the program as with the first concert, an audience of considerable numbers was present. The increased capacity of the hall over the one at Franklin Square made it much better suited for entertainments of this size.

The next concert of the clubs, the third of the season, will be held at Wakefield on next Friday evening. It will be in the Town Hall at 8 o'clock and members will leave North Station on the 6:55 o'clock train.

The announcement to effect that single tickets will be sold for the Fall Concert and Dance has been given out by the management of the clubs. The dance is to be a cut-in affair with no programs, making such an arrangement possible. Single tickets for the concert and dance may be purchased today in the main lobby from 12 to 2 o'clock.

Following the resignation of A. S. Redway '23, leader of the Banjo Club, the management announced the selection of G. F. Cook '23, to take the vacant place. Cook was Assistant Leader before this change was made and D. A. Shepard '26, has been chosen to fill the position thus left open.

COLONEL PHISTERER TO HEAD MILITARY

To Take up Duties as Head of Military Science in Two Weeks.

Colonel Frederick W. Phisterer, inspector-general of the Coast Artillery Corps, has been detailed to the Institute as a Professor of Military Science, where it is expected that he will take up his duties as head of the department in about two weeks. The date as yet has not been definitely determined.

Previous to his appointment at the Institute, Colonel Phisterer was detailed in the Inspector-General's Department of the Third Corps Area, Baltimore, Maryland. He graduated from Cornell in 1895 receiving a Mechanical Engineer's degree and in 1896 a master's degree and later in 1897 he received his Doctor of Science degree.

SPEAKERS STUDY UNDER WELL KNOWN TEACHER

H. T. Cahill Gives Third Lesson in Public Speaking

At a meeting of the Speakers Club held in Walker last night, Mr. H. T. Cahill conducted the third lesson of a special course in public speaking which he is giving the club. He defined the three essentials of public speaking as courage, enthusiasm, and a well trained memory, employing some system of visualization and association, to help the speaker recall his facts while on his feet. He then proceeded to discuss in detail openings and closings of addresses, and methods of developing a fact.

Mr. Cahill believes that the best way to become adept in the art of public speaking is by actual practice. Therefore the major part of the meeting was devoted to short speeches by the members themselves, in which each was to present some project. The physical aspect of the Institute provoked considerable comment. Plans were advanced for replacing the gravel of the Great Court by trees and shrubbery and the cinders of the Institute backyard by athletic fields and tennis courts. Means for promoting school spirit and also interest in the art of expression at Technology were discussed.

For the next meeting, which will be held Tuesday, November 28, in the Faculty and Alumni room, Walker Memorial, at 5 o'clock, Mr. Cahill suggested that the club members develop their talks, by first, statement of the facts; second, argument for the facts; and third, the appeal.

RADIO SOCIETY NAVY YARD TRIP POSTPONED

Society's Station Handles 367 Messages in Month

Owing to the sickness of the District Communication Superintendent of the First Naval District, it is necessary to postpone until next week, the trip which the M. I. T. Radio Society was to make next Saturday. The Society had planned to visit the radio station at the Boston Navy Yard, for which permission has to be given by the District Superintendent.

Between October 20 and November 20, the society's radio station IXM handled 367 messages. This number is more than the total amount handled all last year by IXM.

Experimental work on receiving apparatus is being carried on at present by members of the society. The most important work is being done on an Armstrong super-regenerative set, using one tube.

CORP. XV SMOKER HELD LAST NIGHT IN WALKER

Industrial Problems Subject of Addresses of Two Speakers

Corporation XV held its third smoker of the year in the Faculty dining room of Walker Memorial last evening. Mr. John Calder of Swift & Company and Professor Freeland of the Institute were the speakers.

Mr. Calder, who has had much experience with labor problems, spoke to the Corporation on the relations which exist between factory heads and workers. He stressed upon the extreme necessity of having hospitals, lunchrooms, recreation grounds, and protections of every nature, for the workers. In so doing, Mr. Calder said, a more willing spirit will exist between the workers.

Stock Being Distributed by Members
Mr. Calder is the director of the Industrial Relations department of the Swift & Company. He is by training a mechanical engineer, having had connection with the New York Shipbuilding Corporation, the Remington Typewriter Company, and the Cadillac Motor Company.

Professor Freeland gave a short talk on the general aspects of business managements.

One hundred shares of stock are now being distributed by members of the Corporation to new Sophomores and freshmen members. These may be obtained at the Combined Societies room or at any of the smokers.

The moving pictures, which have been planned for Friday have been cancelled to avoid conflict with the Chemical Engineering Society smoker. However they will be shown some time next week, as will be announced later.

TECHNIQUE PROOFS CAN BE SEEN IN THE OFFICE
