PLANS MADE TO FORM  
R. O. T. C. RIFLE TEAM

A rifle team is to be organized by the Military Science Department for the purpose of entering the indoor rifle matches held in the First Corps Area from January 1 to March 15 between the Senior Units of the R. O. T. C.

The team will consist of 10 members and 5 alternates. The men, who must be members of the R. O. T. C., are to be chosen from Senior, Junior, Sophomore or freshman classes. The final selection of the team will be made at the beginning of the second term, as a report must be filed before the match opens of the men who are competing.

Practice will be held in the gallery range on the athletic field from 1 to 5 o'clock on Tuesdays and Fridays, and from 1 to 2 o'clock on Mondays and Thursdays. Rifles, ammunition, and targets will be furnished by the Military Science Department. 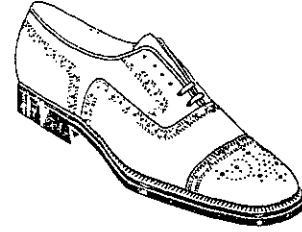
J. COONLEY TO SPEAK

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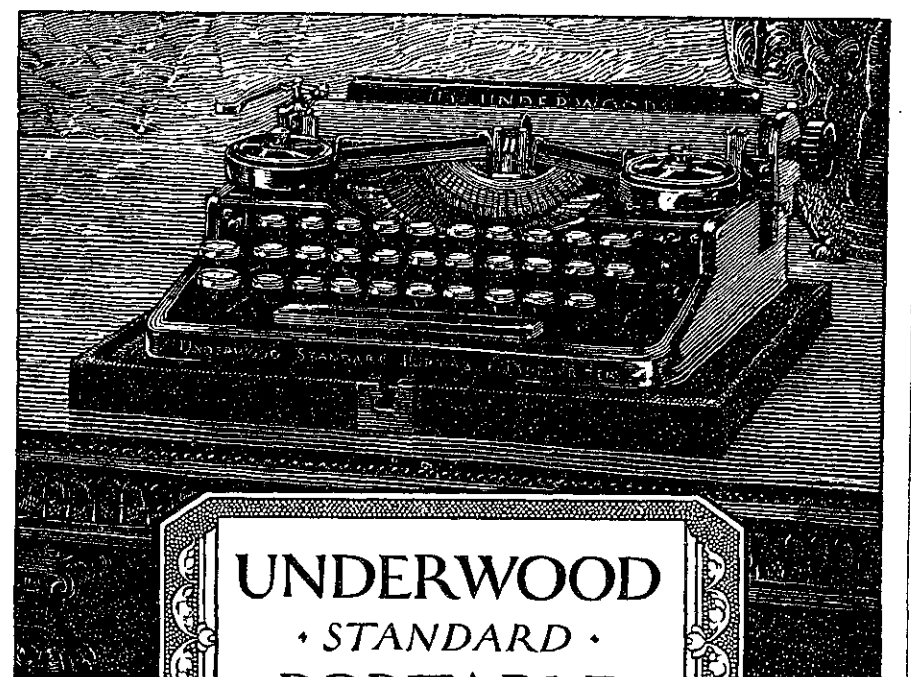
