HOURLY PROGRAM PLANNED

Mr. Charles E. Griffith, who with Mrs. Wallace M. Ross is to give a recital tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock in room 10-250, is not a newcomer to the Institute, for facts have recently been brought to light which show that his connections with Technology are of long standing. His active work in the Aviation Ground School and his later work in the Endowment Drive constitute the main points in his record here.

Many responses to the invitations to the recital sent out by B. M. Mossman '24, Director of the Social Department of the T. C. A., under whose auspices the recital is being given, have been received, and the department expects that the large attendance at its last entertainment of this type, a similar recital by Mrs. Ross and Mr. Griffith in 1921, will be repeated. All connected with the Institute are invited to come and bring their friends.

The same program which is to be presented tomorrow was given last Tuesday at Dartmouth College under the auspices of the Department of Music there. Mr. Griffith, a Dartmouth '15 man, presented in his Senior year a series of monthly concerts with Mrs. Ross, and since that time they have played together in similar entertainments many times. Mrs. Ross, well known in Brookline music circles, is a pupil of Arthur Foote.

President of the Class of 1915 at Dartmouth, Mr. Griffith was also the leader of the student orchestra and the head of the Dartmouth Christian Association. He won the Barret Achievement Cup, the highest honor extended any undergraduate at Dartmouth, and was said to be the best violinist that had come there for a considerable period of years. At Technology he was commander of his squadron in the Aviation Ground School and in the Endowment Drive of 1919 turned in the second largest amount subscribed by any squadron.

Obtained through the courtesy of the American Sugar Refinery, the four reels will show in detail, the cutting, the shipping, and the refining of raw sugar. The pictures on the cutting were taken at Cuba, while the pictures on the refining were taken at the American Sugar Refining Company factory, here in Boston.

The committee will be assisted in their decision by prominent musical authorities of Boston. In case two good songs are obtained, they will both be placed before the students at the Spring Concert, and the student body will then decide which is the best.

ELECTIONS ANNOUNCED

Wednesday evening, at the University Club, the Tech Engineering News had its third annual banquet at which there were 66 present. With few exceptions, the guests attended in formal dress. F. G. Harmon '23, acted in the capacity of toast-master and introduced the following speakers of the evening.

Dr. A. W. Rowe '01, spoke on the recently formed Calumet Club which is an organization to provide hosts to visiting athletic teams. A. T. Hopkins '97, discussed the founding of the Cleveland Technology Club of which he was the prime mover.

Professor Rogers Comments

H. J. Carlson '92, in the course of his speech, mentioned that a thousand New York alumni would have a reception on December 16 for President-Elect S. W. Stratton at the Biltmore Hotel. Also, that another big one, held by the students at Technology, is planned. He remarked on the need of a new Tech Song, jocularly expressing the opinion that the Stein Song has become no longer appropriate since Mr. Volstead attained to fame.

Professor R. E. Rogers, in speaking of the Tech Engineering News, said that he thought that it had everything that would be appropriate in an engineering magazine. He offered some criticism in the course of his remarks. J. P. Munroe '82, gave a history of the predecessors of the Tech Engineering News.

Elihu Thomson spoke of his responsibilities while acting as President; and also of the task of obtaining a satisfactory new president. He said that he felt that Dr. Stratton is the logical man for the position.

Bradshaw '23. A Jazz Band of Institute men furnished amusement for an hour and the majority of the entertainment was by the Technology members present.

Six Story Club Planned

The main discussion brought up before the meeting was the proposed building plans for the new University Club. The building is to be six stories high, located on Arlington Street, near the Public Gardens, and will have a large basement which is to be devoted to athletics entirely. A main dining room and a large grill room will be located on the first floor. On the second floor many private dining rooms and a ladies' dining room and reception room will occupy this floor. A library, card room and pool and billiard room will be on the third floor. Bed rooms, both with and without private baths will be on the remaining floors.
