

TECHNIQUE STARTS CAMPAIGN MONDAY

Signups Sold in Main Lobby
and Walker Memorial
During Week

REDEEMABLE NEXT APRIL

Next Monday, January 16, the Technique Sign-up Campaign begins at the Institute. Canvassers will be in the Main Lobby and in Walker Memorial to receive sign-ups and issue special buttons. The campaign ends at noon, Saturday, January 20.

The sign-ups, which cost a dollar, entitle the holders to a copy of Technique 1924, upon presentation with the remaining \$2.50. No one who has not a sign-up can obtain a Technique nor can he enter the Technique Rush. The sign-ups will be redeemed during the first week of April, and must be presented not later than May 1.

Issue Technique Buttons

In last year's campaign 2,000 sign-ups were sold students, totalling about sixty per cent of the total enrollment of the Institute. Even this proportion is low, however, in comparison with the usual number of subscriptions to yearbooks in other colleges of the country.

With the sign-ups special buttons bearing a large red "T" will be issued to indicate that the wearer has signed up for his Technique. The Technique Board hopes that for their mutual convenience students will sign up with the canvassers in the corridors, so that it will not be necessary for canvassers to go into the drawing rooms and laboratories to obtain sign-ups.

NEXT MECHANICAL TRIP THRU WATCH FACTORY

Will Inspect Plant of Famous
Waltham Watch Factory
Next Week

On Friday, Jan. 19, the Mechanical Engineering Society will travel to Waltham and visit that city's famed watch factory. DINE TO DISCUSS SERVICE BY DEPUTATION TRIPS

Mr. Boynton Merrill Will Talk
to Gathering Tomorrow
in North Hall

One of the services rendered by the Technology Christian Association each year is in deputation, a service which has not been taken up as yet this school year, and a meeting of all who are interested in knowing more about and helping in this work will be held tomorrow evening in the grill room of Walker, at 6 o'clock. Dinner will be served and Mr. Boynton Merrill, Associate Pastor of Old South Church, will explain the purposes and details of deputations.

Each year week end trips to neighboring districts and towns are made by college men where they hold meetings of the young people there in the interests of education, of entertainment, of service, and of practical Christianity. Mr. Merrill, who is to explain this work fully at the dinner Thursday, was in charge of this work while at Dartmouth College in 1913-14 and under him its services were said to be more far reaching than ever before.

Letters of invitation to the dinner have been sent by C. M. Phelps '24, Director of Deputations for the T. C. A., to 60 men at the Institute and all others who feel interested in knowing more about this service are asked to come. All are asked to notify the director or leave word at Association office if they are to attend. There will be present groups from Harvard and Boston Universities, both of which are doing similar work along this line.

This medal will be on exhibition tomorrow night at the Aero Society smoker, which will be held in the Air Service Dugout, room 1-090, at 7:30 o'clock.

Pictures of the contest, taken by Professor Warner, will be on sale at this time; and Professor L. S. Marks, head of the department of Engineering at Harvard, will speak on "Supplying Fuel Aviation Motors." His talk will include a thorough discussion of gasoline systems and carburetors. At the close of the address those present will be given an opportunity to ask questions on the subject.

A quantity of smokes will be provided, and all students who are interested in aeronautics are cordially invited to attend.

The Technology Chapter of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers has been invited to a meeting of the Boston Section of the American Welding Society, Friday, January 19, at the Lynn plants of the General Electric Co.

The program of the meeting opens at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, when the General Electric executives will receive the members of the Welding Society and their guests, and will adjourn at 10 o'clock. The program of the day includes a welding demonstration, and an address by Professor Elihu Thomson, past acting president of the Institute; movies on the making of automobiles; talks by P. O. Noble and Professor A. S. Kinsey; a luncheon in the company's restaurant; and lectures on "The Importance of Research to the Development of the Welding Industry," by Professor C. A. Adams, and "The Manufacture of Welding Wires" by C. A. McCune.

The names of all members of the Mechanical Engineering Society who desire to make this trip must be in the hands of one of the officers of the society by one o'clock next Saturday afternoon, as the General Electric Co. must know how many visitors to make arrangements to receive.

TECHNOLOGY BASKETBALL TEAM CHRISTENS NEW GYM IN CLASH WITH TUFTS FIVE TONIGHT

Engineers Seek to Open Home Season With
Win and Repeat 1922 Victory
Over Jumbo Outfit

Technology's Varsity basketball team opens its home schedule tonight against the veteran Tufts five, the contest being the first one ever played on the floor of the New Gym. The Jumbos are bringing a seasoned outfit to clash with the Cardinal and Gray defenders but Captain Cook will meet them with almost the same team that sent them down to defeat last year. The invaders are going into the contest determined to avenge that defeat. The home team is confident that it can remain this year, like last, unbeaten on its own floor, and is specially anxious to make the first game in the new quarters result in a victory. The inevitable result is a fast, hard fought battle with the odds slightly inclined to favor the Institute representatives.

FELLOWSHIPS GIVEN IN BELGIAN UNIVERSITIES

Six to Be Awarded to American
Graduates for Study
Next Year

The Commission for Relief in Belgium has announced that a limited number of Graduate Fellowships will be awarded for work in Belgian Universities during the academic year, 1923-1924. Fellowships will be given only to American citizens in good health, having ability to speak French well, who have definite plans for study in Belgium, and who will be a graduate of a college or professional school before September, 1923. Instructors, however, must rank lower than associate professor in order to be eligible.

The holder of each fellowship will receive 12,000 francs plus tuition fees, and first class travelling expenses to and from the Belgian University. A total of no more than six fellowships will be awarded during 1923-1924, and in general the student is allowed to choose the university at which he desires to study, in some cases being allowed to take courses at more than one institution.

Opportunity Offered to '23 Men

The Commission offers fellowships in the following subjects: Bacteriology, Botany, Civil Engineering, Egyptology, Electricity, French Literature, Geology, Greek Literature, History, International Law, Mathematics, Medicine, Mediaeval Philosophy, Mining Engineering, Morphology, Organic Chemistry, Paleontology, Philosophy, Physiology, Psychology, Surgery, Zoology.

Men who are granted fellowships are to report in Brussels by October 1, 1923, and to stay in Belgium for at least eight months. Any Technology men who are interested should apply for further information to the Fellowship Committee, C. R. B. Educational Foundation, Inc., 12 Broadway, New York City.

Exceptional opportunity is offered to '23 men desiring to continue their education abroad, by taking advantage of these fellowships, for the choice of studies is so large as to afford higher training in almost any of the various courses which these men are at present taking.

SOPHOMORES PLAN MANY ACTIVITIES FOR TERM

Larger Appropriation Now
Available

Many activities are being planned for the members of the Sophomore class this term by the class officers. At a meeting of the executive committee of the class to be held next Friday arrangements will be made for a class banquet and a dance, scheduled for a little later in the term. Owing to the considerable increase in the appropriation received from the student tax resulting from a redistribution of the budget, more extensive class activities will be possible this year than ever before. The ratification of the succession of Shedd Vandenberg '25, vice-president of the Sophomore class, to the post of president, will be considered at this meeting. The office of class president has been left vacant by the withdrawal from the Institute of P. H. Carrier '25.

The Varsity begins play at 8 o'clock while the preliminary contest between the Technology and Tufts freshmen is scheduled to begin at 7 o'clock. All arrangements have been made for handling a large number of spectators as it is expected with the new seating facilities which will accommodate between 350-400 people, many more students will take the opportunity of seeing the home games than in former years when the space for accommodating spectators was very limited.

Center Stand Seats Reserved

A student registration certificate will admit at the door, but most of the seats in the center of the stands will be reserved and tickets for these seats can be obtained at the door for fifty cents. The seats at the ends of the stand will not be reserved. The management has made all arrangements as convenient as possible so as to insure a big attendance at the opening game, and with the new gym in use it is expected the Institute team will have more spectators than was possible in the old gym quarters.

Clear Record Engineer Goal

Owing to their victory in the opening game with Northeastern Saturday evening by the margin of one point, the Engineers can be depended upon tonight to put a fighting combination on the floor to face the Tufts basketball men. With the initial contest of the season recorded as a victory, every man on the team will be right on his toes to put forth his best efforts and repeat the feat of the opener keeping Technology's basketball slate clean this season.

Both Teams Play Veterans

Both Technology and Tufts will present a line-up which is practically composed of veterans of last year. The Engineers will have available a complete veteran combination, while Tufts have four men from last year's team in their probable lineup. As both teams have played only one game a piece during the present season, it is hard to judge what the final outcome tonight will be.
