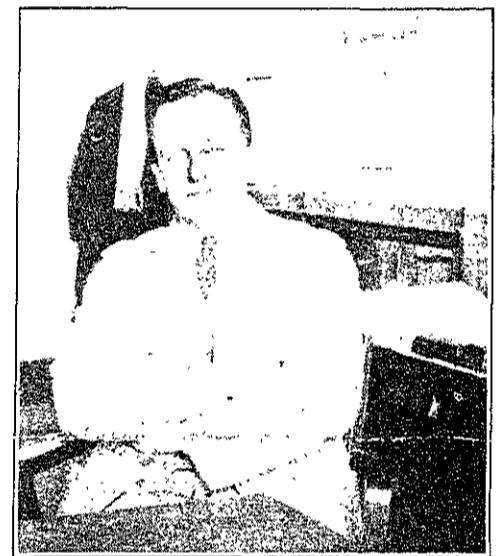

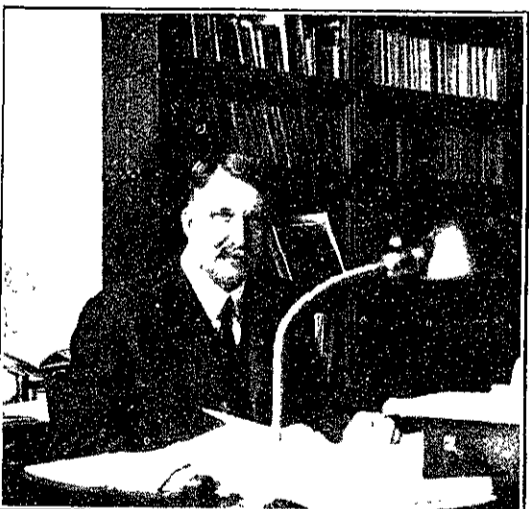


PRESIDENT STRATTON

Bursar Ford, in the office where our money goes. He came here in 1913 from the Old Colony Trust Company.



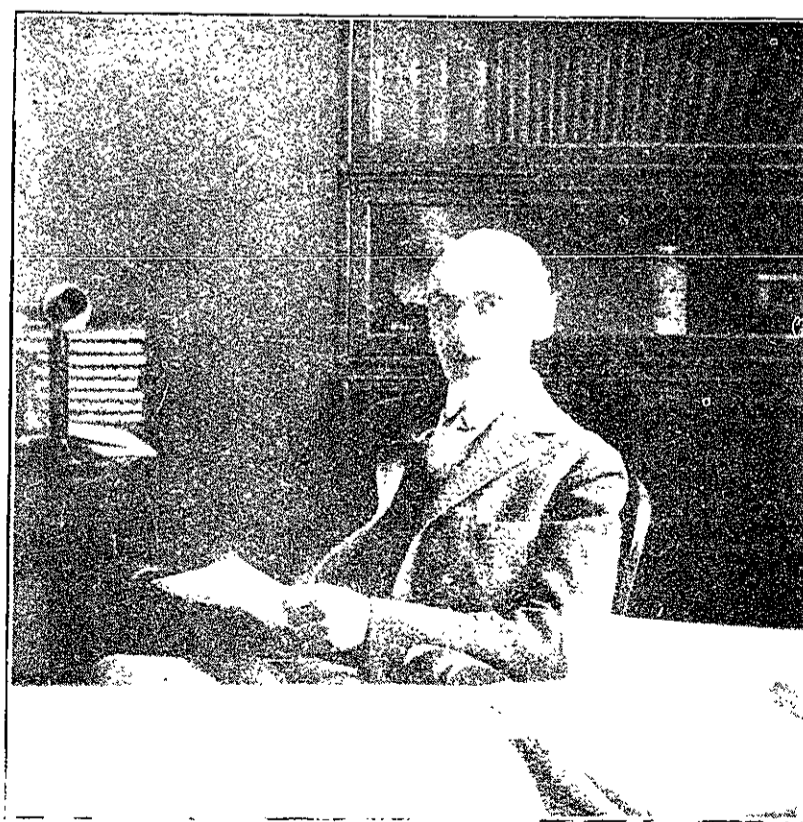
Prof. C. E. Fuller who teaches another of those "cinch" courses—Applied Mechanics.
