Bruins Duck Opponents in N. E. Intercollegiate Swim at "Y"

The final events of the New England Intercollegiate Swimming meet, held last week at the Boston Y. M. C. A. tank, found the Engineer team badly in the ruck, with Brown leading the field with 48 1/2 points, Dartmouth second with 28, and Technology, Amherst, and Wesleyan trailing.

The only places which were credited to Technology were a fourth in the 50 yard dash, which went to Nip Marsh, and a third in the fancy dives credited to Paul Carver. These were the only two Engineers who qualified in the semi-finals on the day before the big meet.

Davy Jones of the Brown team was in excellent form for the races, taking a first in the 50 yard backstroke, a second in the 50 yard dash, and finishing up on the winning end of the 220 yard relay.
