Another point that to him meant a great deal is the fact of attendance. He explained, "If you are on the job every day, fine. If you miss a day it may be just the day that your boss wants you the most."

"Wherever I have been employed I have always tried to work the fellow ahead out of his job. I don't mean by any underhand means but by doing so much of his work that when he got out I had already done most of his duties and was in that way better qualified than any other man."

Get "The Go Getter"

"Always finish your job. You can't finish a job for a piker boss but if he is any kind of a fellow and sends you out for something get it. There is a little book, "The Go Getter" by Peter B. Kyne, which is a wonderful story. If you don't have a copy of it for goodness' sake in the morning go

pawn your undershirt and get a copy.

"In trying to get team work from your men keep them posted. What kind of a football team would you have if only one man knew what the play was going to be. It is the same thing when you are in industry, if an employer hasn't faith enough in his men to tell them what he wants and what they are working for then he better get another set of men or else get out of the business.
