hoarding their funds, and expect to go on a spree next winter. The amount of 73 cents is set aside from each \$9 student tax to be used for the development of class spirit in each class. The total amount thus available among the classes in proportion to their respective enrollment. The amounts each class are getting this year are approximately as follows: Seniors \$565. Juniors \$440. Sophomores \$485. and freshmen \$420. Two hundred dollars of the total goes each year to the Senior class permanent fund, which is devoted to the promotion of alumni activities of the graduating class. The Juniors have decided to center their social activities for this year on the Junior Prom, and will reserve their share of the fund to go toward their Senior activities. The Sophomores have already given a free smoker out of their class fund, and plan no further free entertainments this year. The freshmen have also had a smoker. A part of their fund was used to aid in outfitting the class basketball team. This is in accordance with the original purpose of the fund, which is to promote class athletics as well as spirit.

send four delegates to the Inter-Collegiate Conference. **Change Budgets** The Budget Committee appropriated \$254.53 for the Inter-Collegiate Conference, and also 300 for Intramural baseball. A crew allotment of \$1360 was cancelled and an appropriation of \$1270 substituted for it. Varsity hockey and the Class of '23 also received money, swelling the total new appropriations to \$517.40. The Committee on the Reapportionment of Walker reported that the activities were preparing data for Dr. A. W. Rowe '01, who is making up a petition to the Corporation. The new T. C. A. officers were ratified and the new dormitory house chairmen were approved.

After the acceptance of the committee reports, President R. P. Shaw '23, asked for new business. A dead silence reigned. It continued to reign for a minute, everyone nervously waiting for something to happen. Nothing did. Finally the chairman suggested that a motion for adjournment was in order.

COURSE IV MEN ROUT HARVARD ARCHITECTS

Institute First in Triangular Contest with Crimson and B. A. C.

Technology architects surpassed those from the Harvard School of Architecture and the Boston Architectural Club in every department of the annual triangular competition, the results of which have just been made public. There were two problems for Senior students and two for Junior students. The best of the drawings submitted have been sent down to New York to be entered in the Beaux Arts competition. The plates were judged by a committee of two representatives each from Technology, Harvard, and B. A. C. The class A problems were a reviewing stand and a tapestry sketch. Technology received 2 first medals, 7 second medals, 23 mentions, and 2 failures on the reviewing stand, while Harvard got only 2 second medals and 7 mentions. In the study of a tapestry Harvard came out slightly better, securing 1 third medal, 2 mentions, and 6 failures to Technology's 1 third medal, 3 mentions, and 12 failures. B. A. C. had no entries in this class.

The Juniors worked on a library for a small city and a state dining room. The results on the library were: Technology—3 first mentions, 10 mentions, 2 failures; Harvard—1 first mention, 6 mentions, and 2 failures; B. A. C.—2 first mentions, 1 mention, 3 failures. On the sketch of a state dining room, the judges awarded to Technology—3 mentions, 7 failures; to Harvard—2 mentions, 6 failures. No B. A. C. architects drew up a dining room sketch.
