

SENIOR COLORS WAVE HIGH AT ANNUAL INTERCLASS TRACK MEET

INDIVIDUAL STARS WIN MAJORITY OF POINTS FOR 1923

H. W. Dexter with Two Firsts and a Third Is Highest Scorer

BLODGETT SMASHES OLD 120-YD. HURDLE RECORD

Mile Goes to Elmer Sanborn—Smith Clocked at 51 2/5 in Quarter Mile

H. W. Dexter '23, was high scoring man of the meet, with a first place in the hammer throw, a first in the shot-put, and a third in the 220 yard low hurdles, totalling 12 points for the Senior score-board. W. B. Gurney '23, with a second and two third places, and F. W. Waterman '24, with a first in the discus and a third in the 100 yard dash, were next in line with 7 points each for their respective classes.

Wind Helps Blodgett to Record

The early part of the meet found the old track record of 16 2/5 seconds for the 120 yard hurdles shattered by Emmons Blodgett '24, who sliced the time down to a flat 16 seconds in one of the best hurdle races seen on the track for a long time. It is not known whether this time will go on the records as the track's best, due to the strong wind that aided the runners, but nevertheless it was a fine race.

Elmer Sanborn came through in his best style in the mile run, when, after trailing Franklin Fricker for three and a half laps, he opened up a sprint that could not be denied, and finished a good twenty yards ahead of his late leader. Leo Poor and Ed Pomykala, running in the third and fourth positions, forced the two leading runners to go the limit of pace-setting for the greater part of the four laps, and it took every ounce of energy from the quartet.

Quarter Proves Close

The 440 yard found Art Smith and Jeppe fighting every inch of the way for the lead, and it was only in the last 50 yards that Captain Art was able to show his heels to his flying adversary. The time of 51 2/5 seconds speaks for itself for the quarter-mile distance.

Ed Heap and Louie Porter, long-time rivals in the dashes, were pitted against each other in the hundred yard event, and Heap's victory was so close that it was hard to say who broke the tape. Porter came back fast in the 220 yard dash, when he won over a field including Bill Gurney, and Ray Holden, and a race with that trio in the fore meant a fast race.

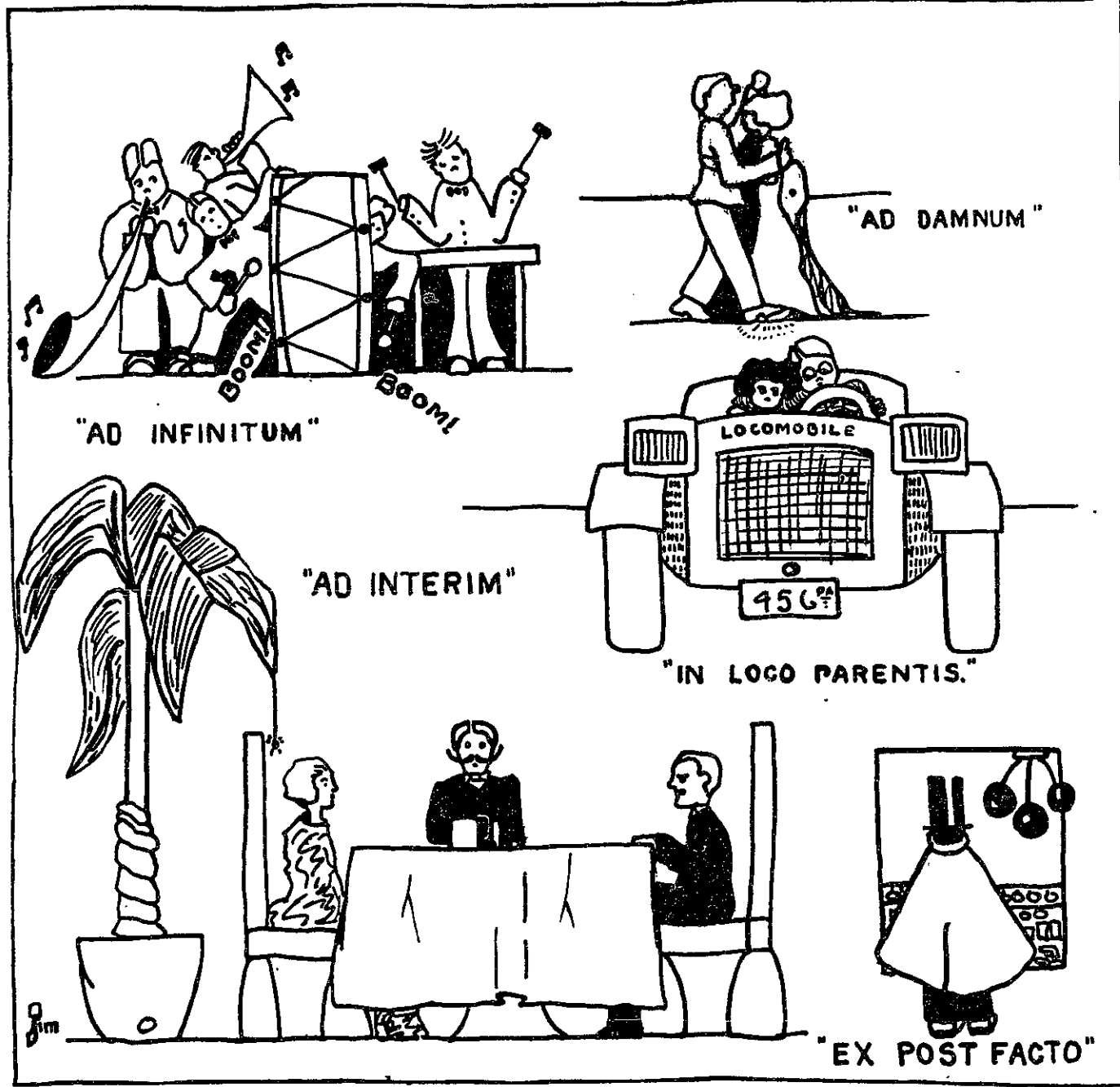

CHEMISTS' RELAY TAKES HONORS

Varsity Eight Wins Over Second Crew in Thursday's Race

Stone School Finds Institute 150 Pounders Slow in Initial Contest

Just following the end of the Technique Rush the Varsity eight crossed the finish line of the mile and five-sixteenths course a scant quarter length ahead of the second eight, in their race Thursday afternoon. Those who have been following the work of the crews found such a close finish rather surprising until they learned that the winning boat had been handicapped three lengths at the start, and that the margin was in reality three and a quarter lengths.

Weather conditions were not ideal, and the time reported, just under seven minutes, is not particularly fast for the distance. Both crews seemed to feel that they had not been at their best in the race, and look for a better showing in the future. In the case of the Varsity, the first race on their schedule comes April 28, with Navy, so the future for them is not very far away.

Stone Leads by Two Lengths

Wednesday the two 150 pound eights had their first race of the season with the Stone School eight and met with rather unexpected results. Covering the same Henley distance, the crews rowed up the basin, finishing the contest on the usual starting line at the Cottage Farm Bridge, with the Stone shell leading the first 150 pounders by two lengths. The second light outfit of Institute oarsmen did not fare as well for, due to a marked propensity toward catching crabs, they were left six lengths behind the leading shell. At times during the race they gained some of the distance lost during the early stages of the contest, but were unable to do so consistently.

Both of the Institute eights were outweighed by the Stone outfit and seemed to lose their ground in trying to row a high stroke. The time of 7 minutes 24 seconds made by the leading boat was quite slow for the course. At no time did the stroke drop to the count of the school eight, the latter crew using their weight in a long rather than a fast stroke.

If not a success for the Technology oarsmen, the race proved that they must do much in little time if they are to make a good showing this season. Accordingly the morning hours of the last few days have been spent in hard practice.

The inopportune breakdown of the launch "Wolf" makes it impossible to give the oarsmen proper coaching at present. Although expected for the last few days the new boat recently purchased for the use of the coaching staff had not been delivered up to yesterday afternoon.
